# **Women Lieutenant Governors:** **Findings based on focus groups** **and a national online survey**



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# Survey Methodology

Lake Research Partners and Bellwether Research and Consulting designed and administered this survey that was conducted online from January 3 to January 12, 2023. The survey reached a total of 2,900 likely 2024 voters nationwide which includes a base sample of 2,000 likely 2024 voters with oversamples of 200 African American, 200 Latinx, 250 AAPI, and 250 Native American/Indigenous likely 2024 voters. The oversamples were weighted down into the base sample to their proper proportion of the universe for a total sample size of 2,000.

The sample was drawn from an online panel of listed adults and screened to be likely 2024 voters. The base sample was weighted by region, region by gender, age, race by gender, and party identification to reflect attributes of the actual population. To control for party identification, the party identification for the total, men, and women was weighted so there is an equal percentage of Democrats and Republicans. African American voters were weighted by region, age, and education; Latinx and Native American voters were weighted by region and age; and AAPI voters were weighted by gender and age. All oversamples were weighted down into the base to reflect their actual proportion of likely 2024 voters.

The margin of error for the base sample is +/-2.2%.

# Focus Group Methodology

- Lake Research Partners and Bellwether Research and Consulting conducted six focus groups with men and women October and November of 2022 segmented as follows:

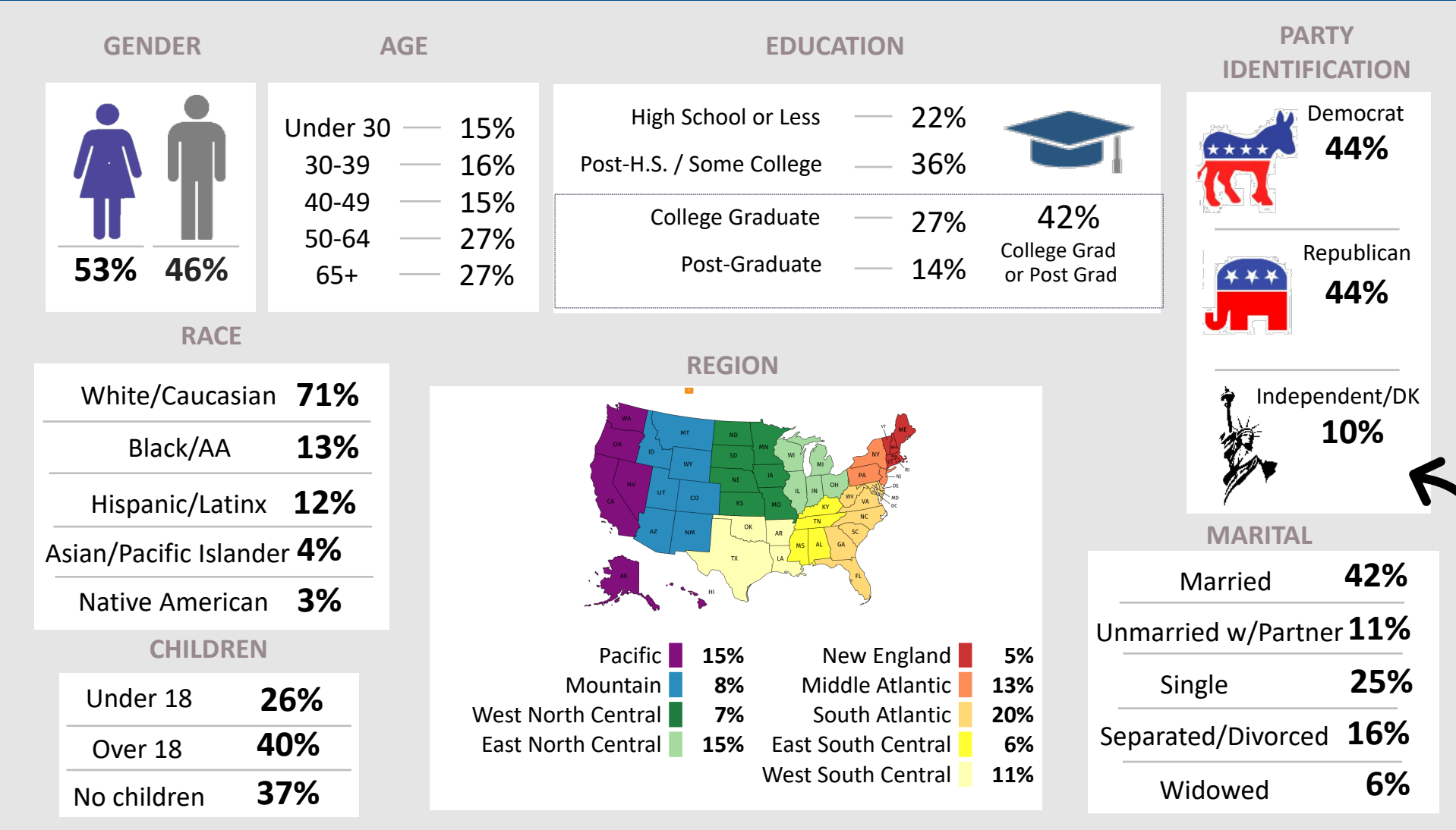

- Participants were recruited to reflect a mix of race, age, urbanicity, marital status, parental status, party identification, ideology, employment status, income, and education.
- This report uses the term “participants” in reference to the participants of the six focus groups.

# Qualitative Research Statement of Limitations

- In opinion research, qualitative research seeks to develop insight and direction rather than quantitatively precise or absolute measures. Because of the limited number of respondents and the restrictions of recruiting, this research must be considered in a qualitative frame of reference.
- The reader may find that some of the information seems inconsistent in character upon first reading this report. These inconsistencies should be considered as valid data from the participant's point of view. That is, the participant may be misinformed or simply wrong in his or her knowledge or judgment, and we should interpret this as useful information about their level of understanding.
- This study cannot be considered reliable or valid in the statistical sense. This type of research is intended to provide knowledge, awareness, attitudes, and opinions about issues and concerns.
- The following limitations are inherent in qualitative research and are stated here to remind the reader that the qualitative data presented here cannot be projected to any universe of individuals.
  - Statement 1. Participants who respond to the invitation of a stranger to participate in this research show themselves to be risk takers and may be somewhat more assertive than non-participants.
  - Statement 2. Some participants speak more often and more forcefully in focus group sessions than other participants, so their opinions tend to carry more weight in the findings.
  - Statement 3. Participants "self-select" themselves.
  - Statement 4. Participants were not selected randomly; as a result each person in the pool of possible participants did not have an equal chance to be selected.

Party identification was weighted with Democrats and Republicans even for the total, men, and women in order to examine gender dynamics outside of partisanship.

# Summary of Key Findings

- Overwhelmingly, voters say they do not prefer a woman or a man lieutenant governor. Of those who do have a preference, there is a substantial gender gap between women and men for whom they prefer to vote; **women prefer a woman lieutenant governor and men prefer a man lieutenant governor. Black, Latinx, AAPI, and Native/Indigenous voters prefer a woman. However, while most say their friends and neighbors would likely have no gender preference, more think they'd prefer a man to a woman.**
- **There is not a lot of intensity around identity politics.** That could be because people do not think of the lieutenant governor office as that important, so they are satisfied with whomever is in the role no matter their race or gender.
- The biggest problem is not support, but **lack of intensity** regarding the lieutenant governor office.
- **Responding to crisis, interacting with the community, and getting things done** are the most important roles and traits to voters for a woman lieutenant governor to play.
- Voters want a lieutenant governor who establishes their own profile. **The lieutenant governor's relationship with the governor is less salient. Voters are more interested in the lieutenant governor's interaction with and relationship to them.**
- They want to know which **results the lieutenant governor has achieved, not how or what she assisted.** They want someone who is a **problem solver** and want to know **what problems she has solved.**

# Summary of Key Findings

- Voters want an **ethical and accountable** lieutenant governor, and one who **gets things done and delivers results**.
- Two areas emerge from the findings that are most important for this role: **listening and communicating with the people/community and being active and getting results**.
- We tested two profiles for a lieutenant governor, one that combined service and results and one that combined values and results. Both profiles included biographical information, including previous elected office. Voters reacted to these profiles and a photo of either an AAPI woman, Black woman, Latina woman, Native women, or white woman lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor. Across race of the hypothetical woman lieutenant governors, **voters gave both lieutenant governor profiles high ratings on being qualified and being likeable**.
- In focus groups, **many voters do not have that much information about a lieutenant governor** and what roles they may play. They feel **they do not hear much from them** or about them. Participants say **a good or successful lieutenant governor is often a connector to or from the people**. Critical roles are to **listen to the people and report back to the governor, connect people to the governor** as well as to **oversee operations and make sure things work**.

# Key Findings – Identity Politics

- More than seven in ten (73%) voters say there is no difference in their gender preference when voting for a lieutenant governor. The rest are split between whether they would prefer to vote for a woman (13%) or a man (12%) lieutenant governor.
  - Across subgroups, about two-thirds or more say there is no difference in the gender preference when voting for a lieutenant governor. However, there is a gender gap in preferring a woman or a man, especially among voters under 50. Nearly a quarter (23%) of younger men prefer to vote for a man, and nearly a quarter (23%) of younger women prefer to vote for a woman. AAPI (19%), Black (17%), Latinx (17%), and Indigenous (17%) voters have a slight preference for a woman lieutenant governor over a man. Democrats (19%) and Independents (14%) favor a woman, while Republicans (18%) are more likely to say they would prefer a man.
- By the end of the survey, voters' preference to vote for a woman for lieutenant governor increases by 6 points (13% to 19%), although 69% say there is no difference.
  - The biggest increases in preference to vote for a woman LG are among AAPI voters (+11 points), women (+9), and Democrats (+9).
- When it comes to what they think their friends and neighbors prefer, nearly a quarter (24%) think their friends and neighbors are more likely to prefer voting for a man for lieutenant governor (9% for a woman). Half (53%) say it would make no difference to their friends and neighbors.
  - Across demographic subgroups, only Black women, Black non-college-educated voters, Independent women, Independent people of color, and Latinx Independents think their friends and neighbors would prefer to vote for a woman over a man lieutenant governor.
- At the end of the survey, voters are slightly more likely to think their friends and neighbors would prefer to vote for a woman (+5 points for woman, -3 for man), but no difference stays the same (53%).
  - AAPI (+9 points) and Black (+8 points) voters, women (+6), and Democrats (+6) make up the biggest increases in assumed preference to vote for a woman.



# Key Findings – Identity Politics

- There is little sign of identity politics for many groups when we ask voters how important it is to them to have more men/women leaders or leaders of different racial and ethnic groups in elected office.
- Voters do not think it is important to have more white leaders, AAPI, Hispanic/Latino/a, Native American/Indigenous, Black/African American, women of color, leaders of color, men, or women leaders. Less than three in ten think having these kinds of leaders is important overall. Nearly half think it is not important at all to have more Native American/Indigenous, AAPI, and Hispanic/Latinx leaders in elected office.
  - There is a partisan gap. While Democrats prioritize electing more women, Republicans – if anything – think we should elect more men.
    - Democrats think electing more women leaders is most important (40% important). Independents think electing more women leaders (30%) and leaders of color (28%) are most important (30% important), while Republicans think electing more men (22% important) and white leaders (20% important) are most important.
  - About half or more Black voters say it is important to have more Black/African American leaders (54%), leaders of color (50%), and women of color leaders (49%).
  - Latinx voters are most likely to say it is important to elect more Hispanic/Latino/a leaders (40% important) and leaders of color (37% important).
  - AAPI voters believe it is most important to elect more AAPI leaders (41%), leaders of color (40%), and women leaders (39%).
  - Half (51%) of Native American voters rate electing more Native American/Indigenous leaders as important.
  - A quarter or fewer white voters say it is important to elect more of any of these kinds of leaders. A quarter (25%) say it is important to elect more women.

# Key Findings – Identity Politics

- Participants in the women focus groups acknowledged there are aspects of the role of lieutenant governor that are different for a woman lieutenant governor. This includes things like having to be more aware of your image, combatting elevated critique from the public, and having to promote your accomplishments more than a man would have to. Men participants did not see as much of a difference.
  - “I think that a female running for governor might have to **promote herself more and her accomplishments than a man might have to do**, just to kind of prove herself. And women don't do as much self-promotion, typically so. That's the only real difference, I'd say.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
  - “I think **she may be judged differently by the public**, by people in the public who have decided that women and men are different and need to be judged differently. But what we've talked about in what a lieutenant governor should do should apply to both men or women, whoever has the role?” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
  - “**As long as they are qualified**, you know that's the thing. You know whatever gender or race, I mean the party is going to try to spin it to get votes. But for me, it's all about qualifications for the role, right.” – Man in a state with a man LG

# Key Findings – Identity Politics

- There was also a distinction between the women and men groups when it came to lieutenant governors of different races. The women noted how the role is harder for women in general, but it becomes ten times harder when you are a woman of color, having to prove yourself more and work harder. The men did not see much of a difference when it comes to the race of the lieutenant governor. Any difference they did note had a more positive association, i.e., being a woman of color would drive more campaign enthusiasm or earn them more votes from people of their same race.
  - “Yeah, I was just going to say that it would be hard enough with just being a woman, but you know...and I am just saying African American, it would be even harder. **You would have to work harder just to prove yourself and to whatever you are implementing, you would have to make sure that you bring it home.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
  - “Well, the same thing. I mean it can be, as I said, a Vietnamese refugee and Hispanic woman, a Black man, **it doesn't matter who it is, I am not distinguishing among races or ethnicity.**” – Man in a state with a man LG
  - “Yeah, **it would like maybe drive some enthusiasm**, you know kind of like when Obama was elected. Sort of that kind of...a lot of that energy beyond him just being a good speaker and a good candidate, it was wow, we are going to really do something by electing an African American or just any non-white male president. So, yeah, it's not the qualification, but it can definitely drive some kind of fashion, I guess... In the campaign, yeah.” – Man in a state with a man LG

# Key Findings – Perception of the Role of Lieutenant Governor

- Many participants do not have that much information about lieutenant governors or who they are, and they feel they do not hear from them.
- They say a good or successful lieutenant governor is often a bridge to and for the people – they listen to communities and report to the governor, oversee operations and make sure things work, and connect people to the governor.
- Voters in the survey think the three most important roles for a woman lieutenant governor to play are
  - focusing on issues that matter in the state (41%),
  - helping the governor and state government respond to a crisis in the state, like a wildfire, hurricane, mass shooting, or other crisis (31%),
  - and listening to the people and bringing that information back (30%).
- The least important roles to voters are
  - sitting on the governor's cabinet (11%),
  - helping constituents with different agencies of government (10%),
  - and representing the state to key stakeholders, like big corporations, other states, or other countries (9%).

# Key Findings – Perception of the Role of Lieutenant Governor

- When asked in the focus groups if there are any roles they think a woman lieutenant governor would handle better than a man, some of the women say all the roles in a provided list, while some of the men insist there is no difference between gender. Other men participants did say that women may be better with working and interacting with children in the community, and some women participants said something similar – that a woman lieutenant governor would be better at doing outreach with people and children because they are more nurturing and compassionate.
- A majority of voters say they have warm, favorable feelings (63%; 28% very favorable) about a governor who has a prominent and active woman lieutenant governor, but three in ten say they are neutral or are not sure if they have favorable or unfavorable feelings about this kind of governor and intensity is low.
  - Among demographic subgroups, Democrats (75%) and AAPI (70%), Black (68%), and Latinx (67%) voters are most likely to say they have warm, favorable feelings about a governor who has a prominent and active woman lieutenant governor. Democrats (81) and women over 50 (80) have the highest mean rating.

# Key Findings – Desirable Qualities for a Woman LG

- In a list of different qualities that a woman lieutenant governor could have, nearly all voters rate all the qualities as important to earning their vote, with over six in ten who rate being ethical (62%), listening to the people (62%), and standing up for the people (61%) as being very important.
  - Standing up for and listening to the people are the most important qualities for voters under 50 (56% stand up for the people, 55% listening to the people), Black voters (59% stand up for the people, 60% listening to the people), and Native/Indigenous voters (75% stand up for the people, 73% listening to the people).
  - For Latinx voters, listening to the people (63% very important) and getting things done (62%) are most important. For AAPI voters, the most important are listening to the people (54%) and being able to handle a crisis (53%).
  - Independents think being accountable (62%) is the most important quality for a woman lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor to have.
- Qualities that are oriented toward a lieutenant governor's relationship and interaction with the governor and institutions are included in a bottom tier of importance for a woman lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor to have.
  - Across demographic subgroups, voters rate supporting the governor as the least or one of the least important qualities.

# Key Findings – The Lieutenant Governor’s Relationship with the Governor

- Survey respondents split into five groups, with each group reacting to an accompanying photo of either a hypothetical AAPI woman lieutenant governor, or a Black, Latina, Native/Indigenous, or white woman lieutenant governor. Across the races of the woman lieutenant governor presented, voters rated qualities of **being the best, effectiveness, honesty, and follow-through**. Men and women voters rate these same traits as most qualified.
- For the white woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements about her relationship with the governor that make voters think she is qualified to become the next governor are:
  - *The person I turn to for **follow-through and to see the job is done*** – 46% very qualified, 75% qualified
  - *She is one of the **most effective** lieutenant governors in the country* – 45% very qualified, 75% qualified
  - *She is the one I can always count on to **tell me the truth*** – 43% very qualified, 72% qualified
- For the Black woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements are:
  - *She is one of the **most effective** lieutenant governors in the country* – 47% very qualified, 72% qualified
  - *She is one of **the best** lieutenant governors in the country* – 46% very qualified, 72% qualified
- For the Latina woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements are:
  - *The person I turn to for **follow-through and to see the job is done*** – 42% very qualified, 70% qualified
  - *She is one of the **most effective** lieutenant governors in the country* – 40% very qualified, 69% qualified
- For the AAPI woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements are:
  - *The person I turn to for **follow-through and to see the job is done*** – 45% very qualified, 73% qualified
  - *She is one of the **most effective** lieutenant governors in the country* – 42% very qualified, 72% qualified
  - *She is the one I can always count on to **tell me the truth*** – 40% very qualified, 69% qualified
- For the Native woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements are:
  - *The person I turn to for **follow-through and to see the job is done*** – 44% very qualified, 72% qualified
  - *She is the one I can always count on to **tell me the truth*** – 39% very qualified, 69% qualified



# Key Findings – The Lieutenant Governor’s Relationship with the Governor

- The statements about the woman lieutenant governor’s relationship with the governor rank similarly across the race of the women, except for the Black lieutenant governor, whose top-testing statements are about being one of the most effective (47% very qualified) and best (46%) lieutenant governors in the country rather than also including follow-through and/or truth-telling.
- For the Native lieutenant governor, being someone the governor can always count on to tell them the truth (39% very qualified) is more important than being one of the most effective in the country (37% very qualified).
- Compared to the other women lieutenant governors, the statement about being one of the most respected members of their team makes the Black woman more qualified.

- A similar yet opposite phenomenon emerges for the Latina woman where compared to the other women lieutenant governors, being a great friend and closest advisor does not make them as qualified as the others.

# Key Findings – What makes a Woman LG Qualified?

- When focus group participants were asked how they can tell a lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor is qualified to be governor, many said it would come down to their **accomplishments** and whether they **have a proven track record**, the kind of **experience they had prior to being lieutenant governor**, and whether they **interact with, understand, and spend time with the community** they represent.
- Examples of things a lieutenant governor could accomplish that would be important to participants include accomplishments that are oriented toward **getting things done and delivering results but are all grounded in community**. They can pass a law or bill, but it should be something that has a direct positive effect on the community. Establishing relationships and being out in the public eye is seen as an accomplishment, and working on an important issue that is directly impacting the state or community is important.
- Noticeably, these top statements are about the lieutenant governor's actions and results, not her relationship to the governor.

# Key Findings – What makes a Woman LG Qualified?

- Looking at another list, again, survey respondents split into five groups, with each group reacting to an accompanying photo of either a hypothetical AAPI woman lieutenant governor, or a Black, Latina, Native/Indigenous, or white woman lieutenant governor. For lieutenant governors of every race, being a **proven problem solver is critical to convey qualifications to be the next governor**. The other top qualifications vary by race, but all relate to prioritizing the needs of people or communities.
- For the white woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements that make voters think she is qualified to become the next governor are:
  - She is a *proven problem solver* – 50% very qualified, 79% qualified
  - The lieutenant governor has made it a priority to *meet with people across the state and focus on their experiences and needs* – 49% very qualified, 75% qualified
- For the Black woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements are:
  - She is a *proven problem solver* – 46% very qualified, 75% qualified
  - A *strong advocate for our different communities*, the lieutenant governor is working to build our state so everyone has the opportunity to get ahead – 46% very qualified, 74% qualified
- For the Latina woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements are:
  - She has been a *relentless fighter for our senior citizens and children* – 42% very qualified, 71% qualified
  - She is a *proven problem solver* – 42% very qualified, 68% qualified
- For the AAPI woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statements are:
  - She is a *proven problem solver* – 47% very qualified, 74% qualified
  - The lieutenant governor has made it a priority to *meet with people across the state and focus on their experiences and needs* – 45% very qualified, 73% qualified
- For the Native woman lieutenant governor, the top testing statement is:
  - She is a *proven problem solver* – 45% very qualified, 72% qualified
- For the hypothetical AAPI, Black, Latina, Native/Indigenous, or white woman lieutenant governors, AAPI, Black, Latinx, Native, and white voters approach the statements about how qualified these hypothetical women candidates are with unique perspectives.

# Key Findings – What makes a Woman LG Qualified?

- The statement “she is a proven problem solver” rates the highest for all the women lieutenant governors, along with being a “strong advocate for our different communities” for the Black woman lieutenant governor (46% very qualified) and being a “relentless fighter for our senior citizens and children” for the Latina lieutenant governor (42% very qualified).
- Compared to the other women lieutenant governors, the statement about leading the program to support small businesses doesn’t work as well for the Latina and Native women as it does for the others. Women have a difficult time proving economic credentials, and we have seen in past research that this is especially challenging for Latina leaders.

- Similarly, the statement about leading initiatives on attracting large employers to the state also does not work as well for the Native woman as it does for the other women lieutenant governors.

# Key Findings - Photos

- In an exercise where survey respondents had to rank ten photos from most qualified to be governor to least qualified to be governor, voters rank the photo of Lieutenant Governor Eleni Kounalakis signing legislation with people around her as the most qualified to be governor (17%) and rank the photo of Lieutenant Governor Diane Primavera cutting a ribbon as least qualified (5%).
  - Across demographic subgroups, voters rank the top 5 photos similarly, except for Black voters who rank the photo of LG Juliana Stratton holding a piece of legislation with the governor and people around her as most qualified (23%).
- When asked what stood out most about the photos, voters volunteer a range of responses. What stood out most is that all of the photos were of women (12%). Photos that showed women working with the people/community (11%) and the different actions they were doing in the photos (7%) also stood out to voters.

# Key Findings - Profiles

- We tested two different profiles of a fictional woman governor who is running to be governor. One profile leads with service and results and the second profile leads with values and results. We conducted a five-way experiment where survey respondents saw photos alongside the profiles of either a hypothetical AAPI, Black, Latina, Native/Indigenous, or white woman lieutenant governor and read profiles that had unique candidate names.
- There is not much difference overall between any of the women lieutenant governors of different race/ethnicities in terms of their qualifications and likeability for either profile. Across voters' partisanship, all women are rated qualified and likeable.
  - **For profile 1**, about one in five think all the women are very qualified (rated 100) and at least seven in ten think all the women are qualified (rated 51-100).
  - For profile 1, about one in five think all the women are very likeable (rated 100) and at least two-thirds think all the women are likeable (rated 51-100) based on the profile 1 language.
  - **For profile 2**, voters rate each woman fairly similarly on being very qualified, though there is a 5-point difference between the Black woman and the AAPI woman. Voters also rate the Black, Native, and white women similarly on overall qualifications, while rating the Latina and AAPI women slightly higher.
  - Likely voters also rate the women similarly on being very likeable, with the Native woman rated slightly lower than the Black and Latina women. The Native woman is rated the least likeable on the overall likeable ratings as well based on the profile 2 language.

# Key Findings – Profile 1 by Key Demographic Subgroups

- By a two-to-one margin, Indigenous voters think the Native woman lieutenant governor is more qualified than the women of other races. Indigenous voters are significantly more likely than white, Black, Latinx, and especially AAPI voters to think the Native woman lieutenant governor is very qualified.
- AAPI voters think the Black lieutenant governor is the most qualified (25% very qualified), whereas Black and Latinx voters (27%, respectively) think the Latina woman lieutenant governor is the most qualified (however, there is not a significant difference in their rating compared to the women of other races).
- Nearly three in ten (29%) Democrats think the Latina and the Black women lieutenant governors are very qualified.
- By at least four points, men (20% very likeable), Democrats (31%), and Black voters (30%) think the Black woman lieutenant governor is the most likeable compared to the women lieutenant governors of different races.
- A quarter of women think the Native and Latina women lieutenant governors are very likeable (26%, respectively), and over three in ten (34%) Indigenous voters think the Native woman lieutenant governor is very likeable.
- Latinx voters think the Latina woman is the most likeable (29% very likeable).

# Key Findings – Profile 2 by Key Demographic Subgroups

- Three in ten Democrats (31%) and Black voters (29%) think the Black woman lieutenant governor is very qualified, and a quarter of women think the Black and Latina women are very qualified.
- Compared to the women of other races, men think the Native woman (21% very qualified) is the most qualified and Latinx voters think the Latina woman and AAPI woman are the most qualified (29% very qualified, respectively).
- Latinx voters also think the Latina and AAPI women are the most likeable (30% very likeable for the Latina, 33% very likeable for the AAPI woman).
- A quarter (26%) of women think the Latina woman is very likeable, and over three in ten (34%) Indigenous voters think the Black woman is very likeable.
- The Black woman lieutenant governor's qualifications and likeability are paralleled for Democrats and Black voters (32% very likeable for Democrats, 28% very likeable for Black voters).

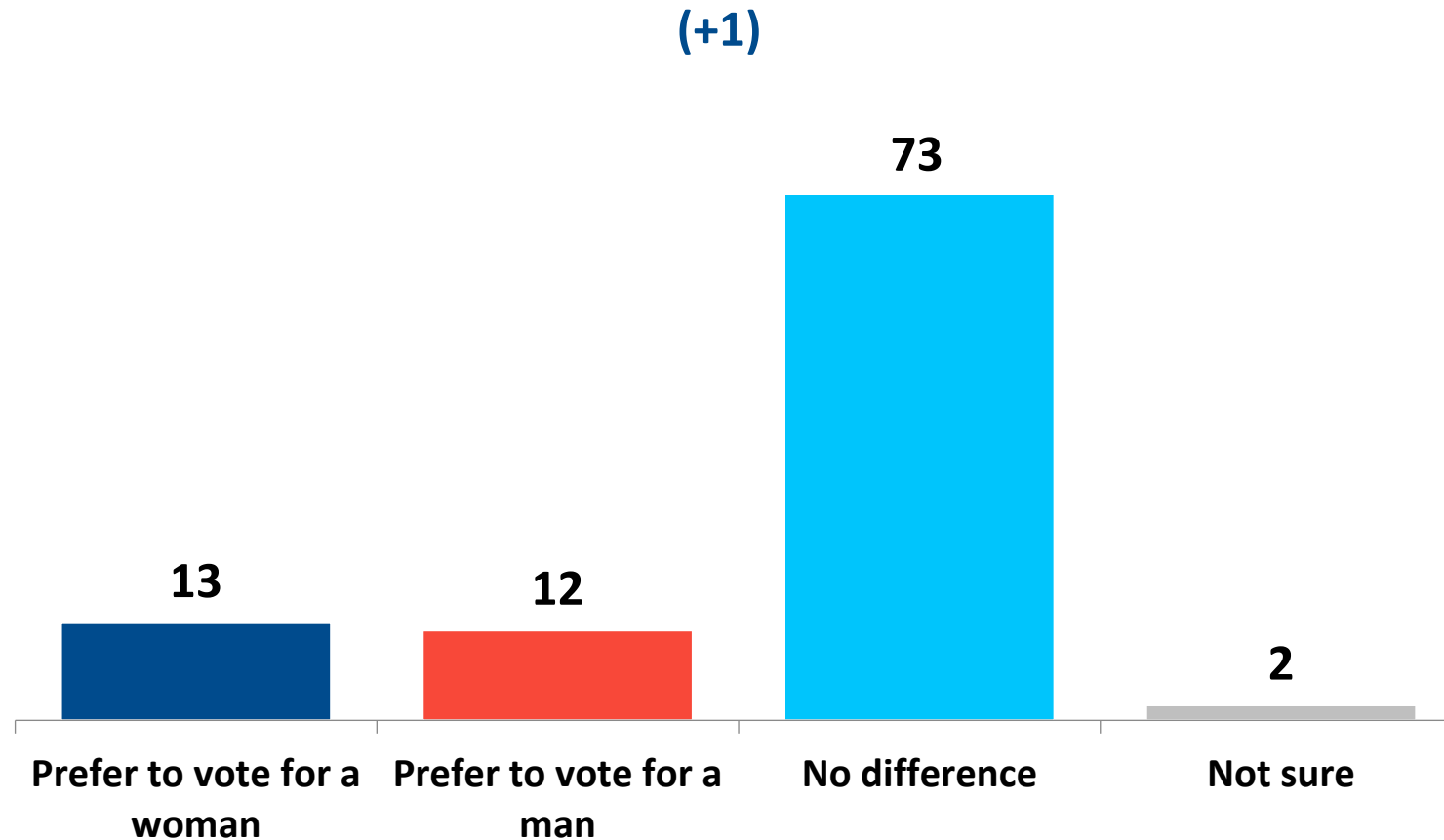

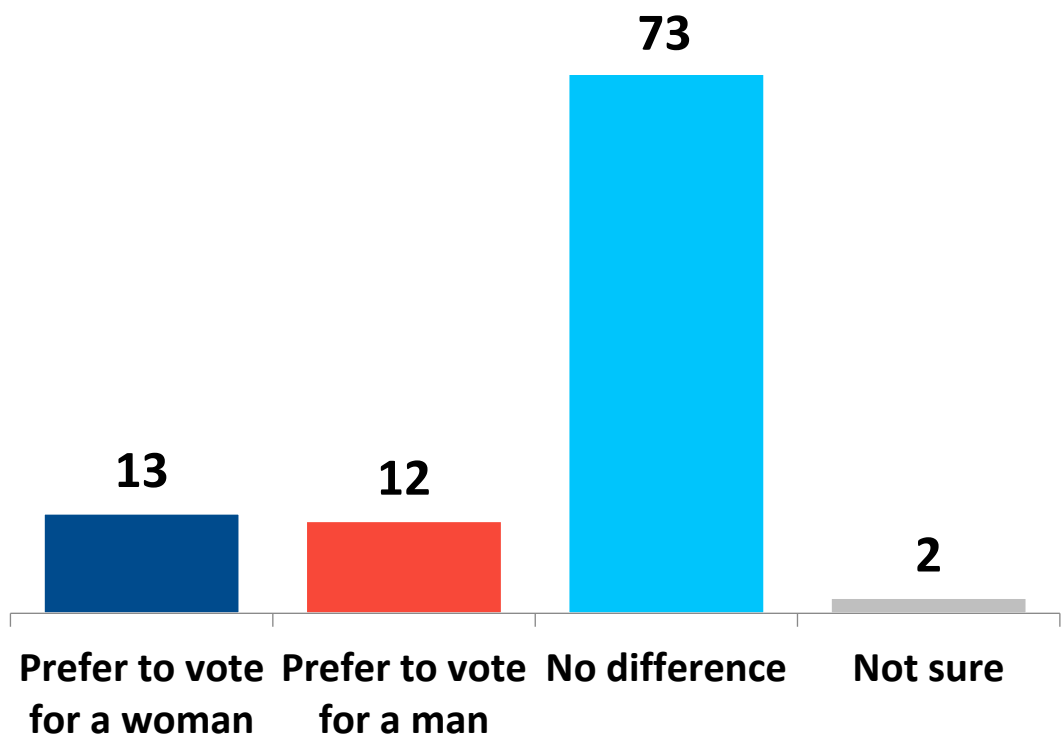

Democrats favor a woman, Republicans favor a man, and Independents split.

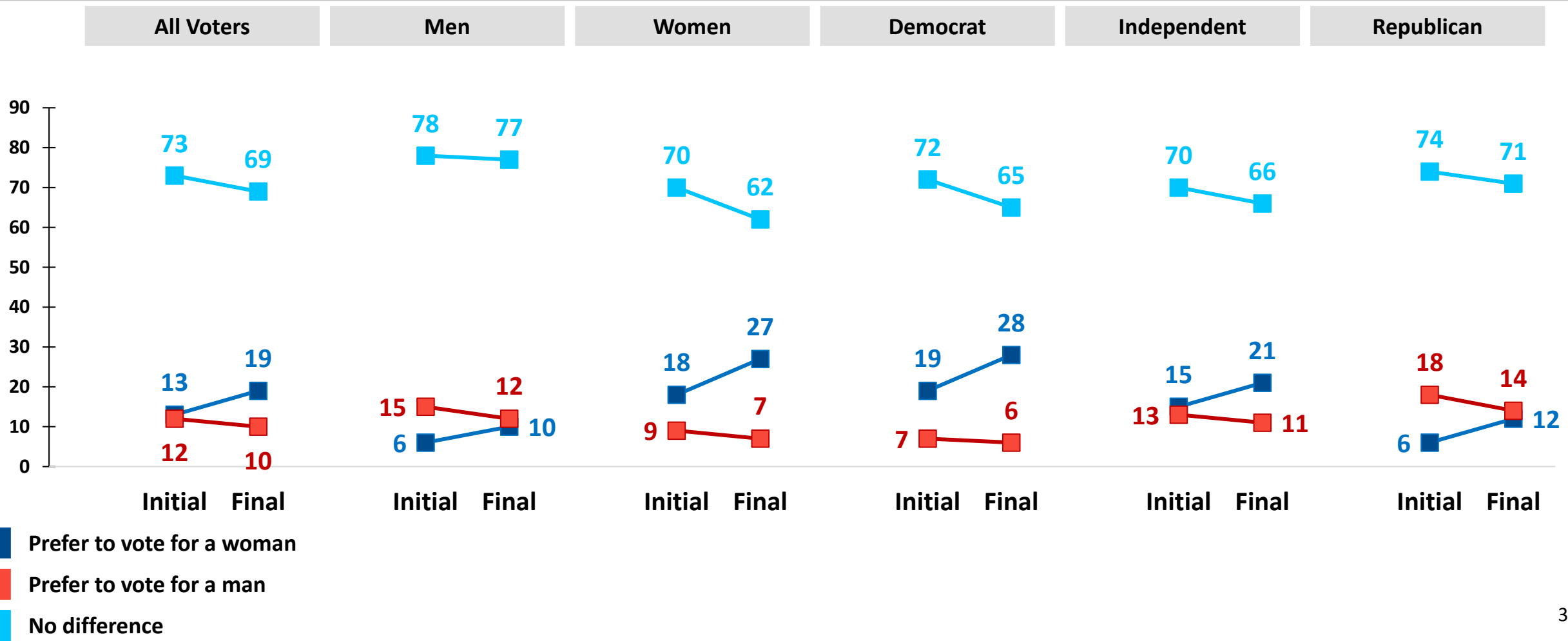

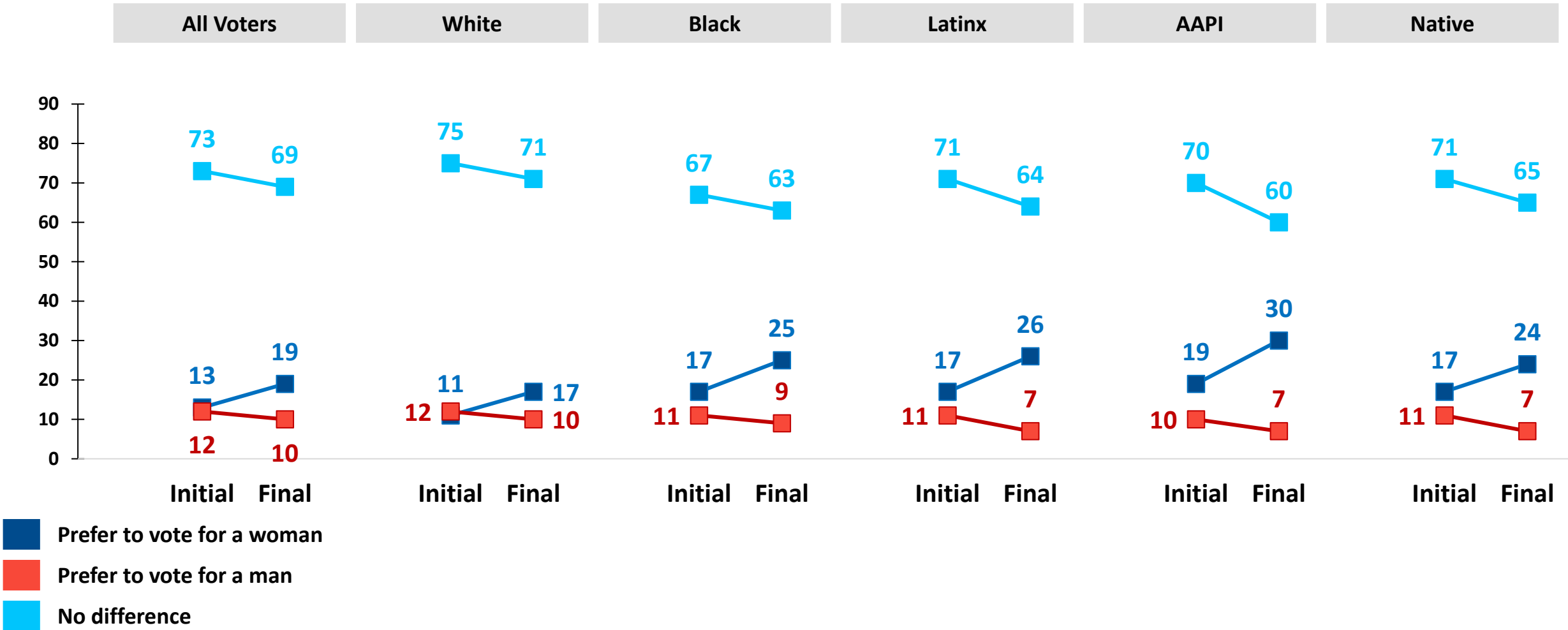
**By the end of the survey, voters' preference to vote for a woman for lieutenant governor increases by 6 points, although 69% say there is no difference. The biggest increases in preference to vote for a woman LG are among women and Democrats, who increase by 9 points. Notably, Independents and Republicans increase by 6 points.**

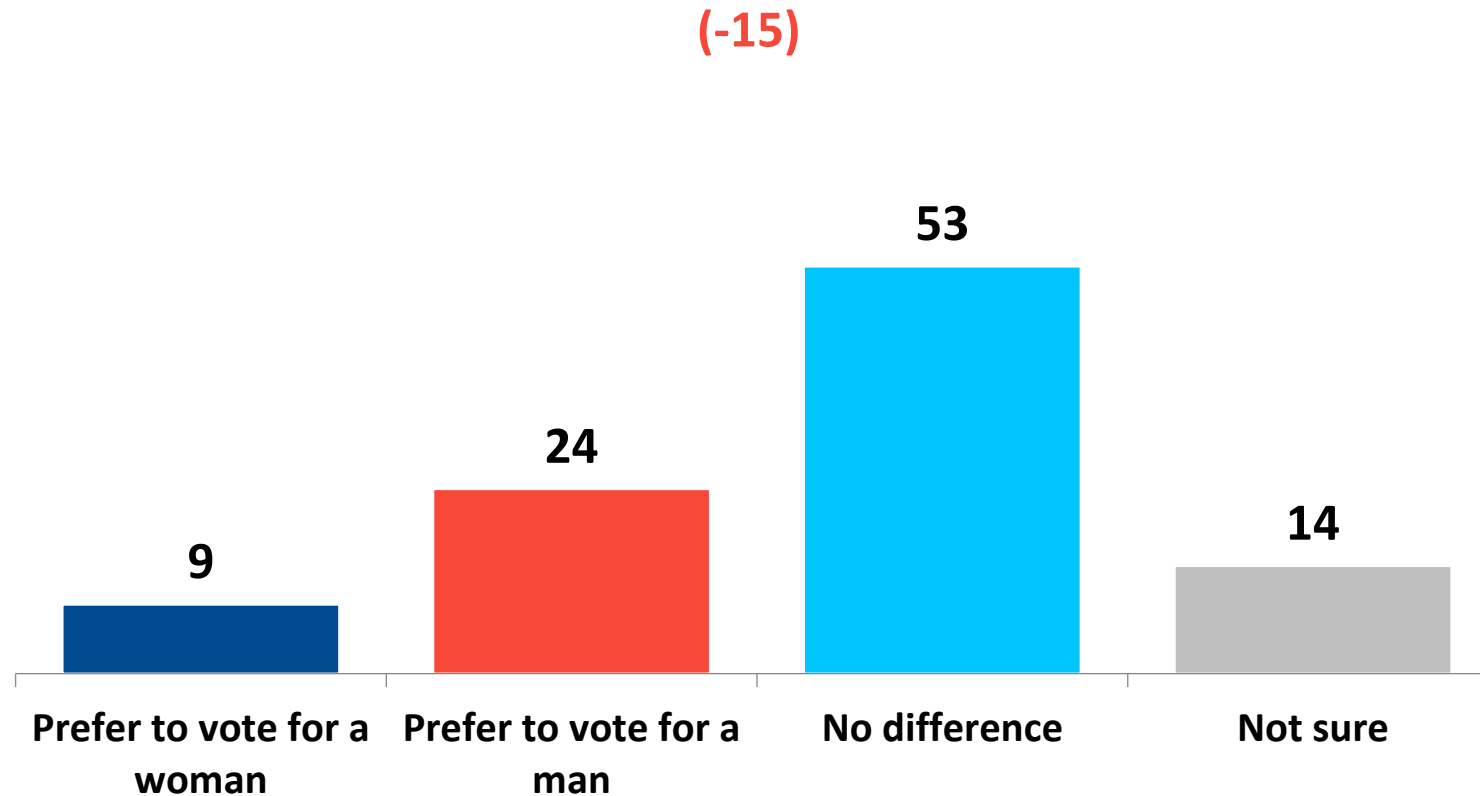

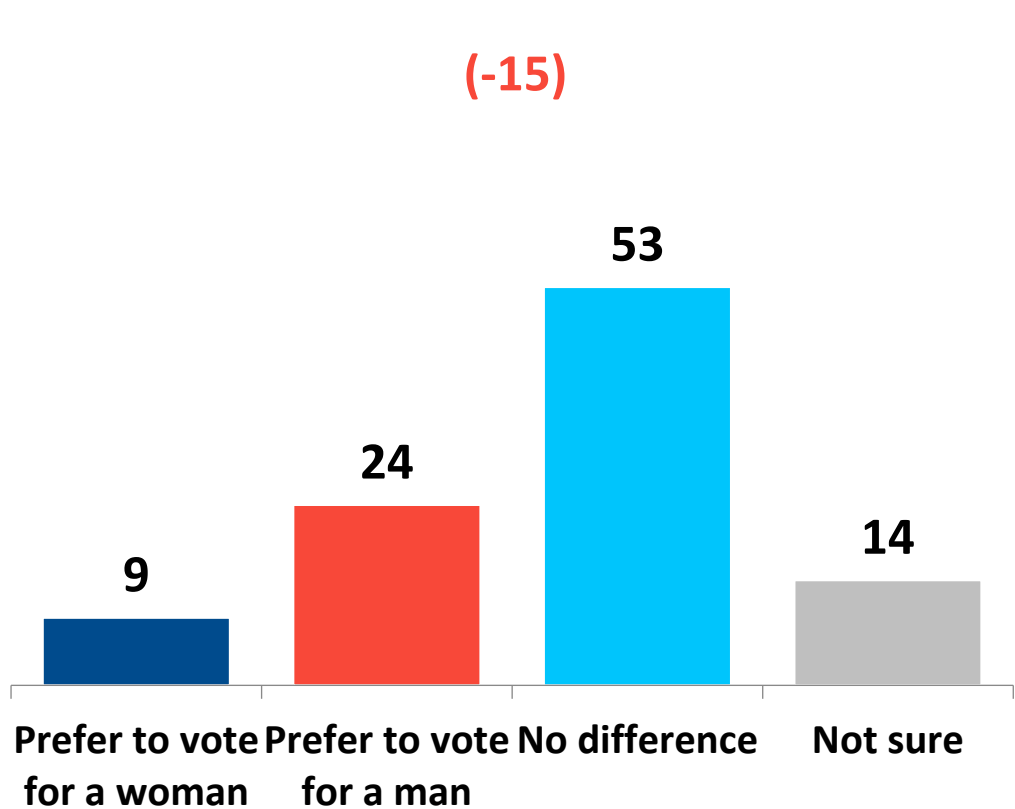

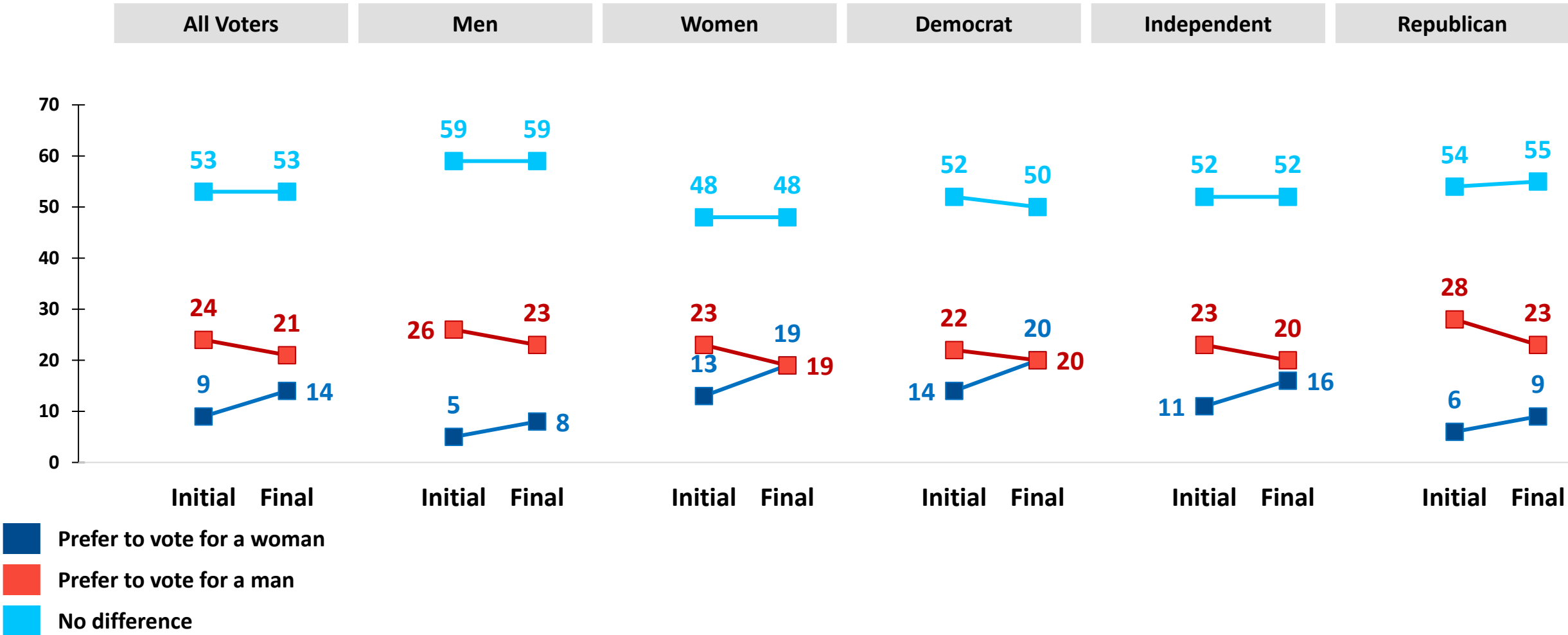

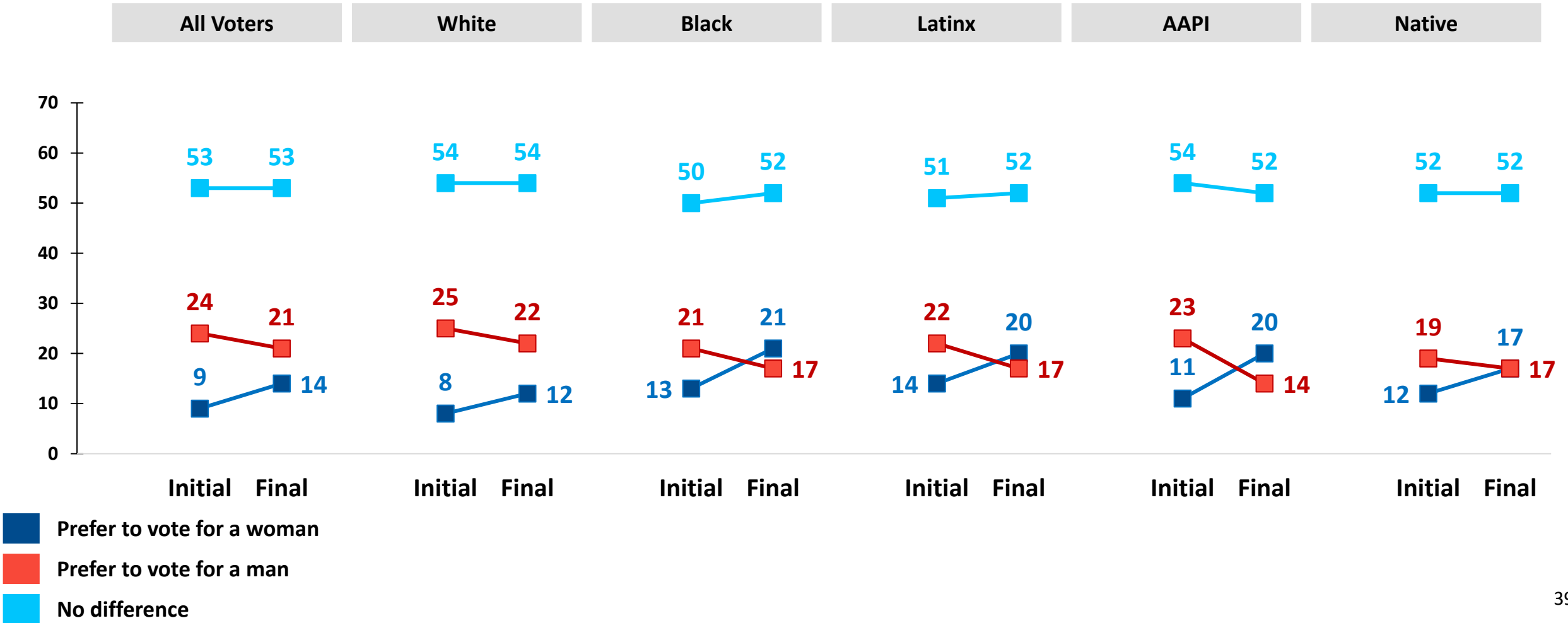
At the end of the survey, voters shift in the direction of thinking their friends and neighbors would prefer to vote for a woman for lieutenant governor (+5 points for woman, -3 for man). Again, women and Democrats make up the biggest increases in preference to vote for a woman (+6 points, respectively). Republicans decrease by 5 points in thinking their friends and neighbors would prefer to vote for a man.

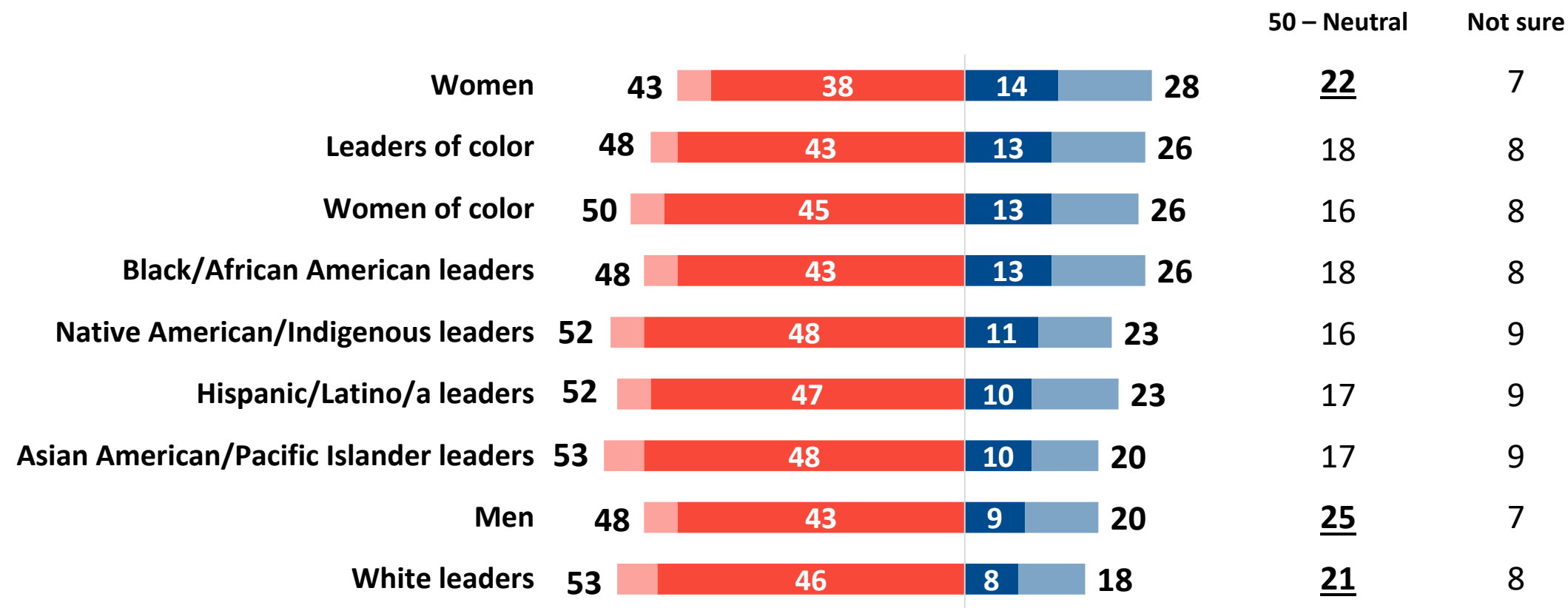
Across racial subgroups, all voters increase by the end of the survey in thinking their friends and neighbors would prefer to vote for a woman LG. Black, Latinx, and AAPI voters switch from assuming a preference for a man to assuming a preference for a woman, and Native voters shift from a 7-point advantage for a man to being tied. AAPI voters increase the most in thinking their friends and neighbors would prefer to vote for a woman (+9 points), followed by Black voters who increase by 8 points.

**Intensity is very low for how important voters think it is to have more diverse leaders in elected office, and fewer than three in ten think having more of these kinds of leaders is important. **There is less of a gender gap; men and women react about the same except that men voters find it more important than women voters to have more men in elected office. **There are more distinct differences based on partisanship. Democrats find it more important than Independents and Republicans to have more of almost every type of leader. Partisan differences are less distinct for men leaders and white leaders. It is most important to Democrats to elect more women, women of color, leaders of color, and Black leaders (and Democrats split between it being important and not important to elect more leaders of color, Black leaders, and women of color). 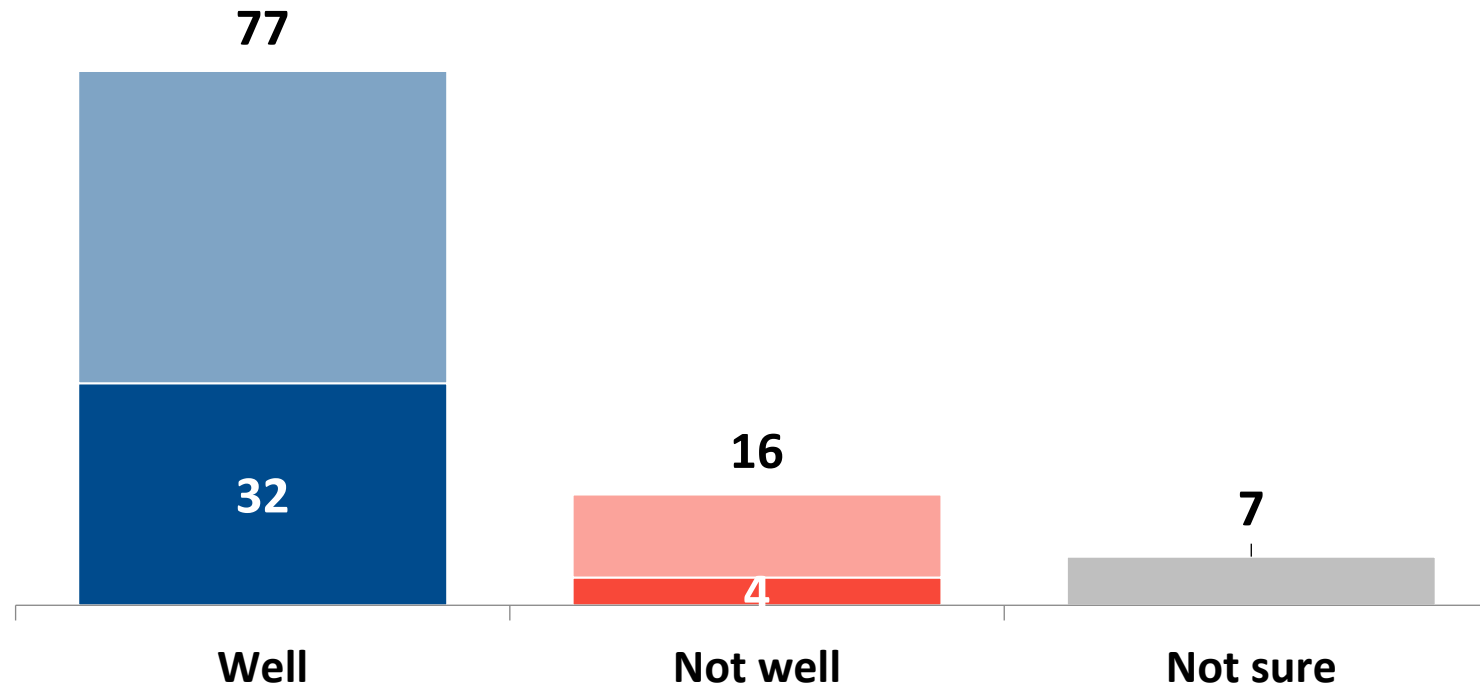

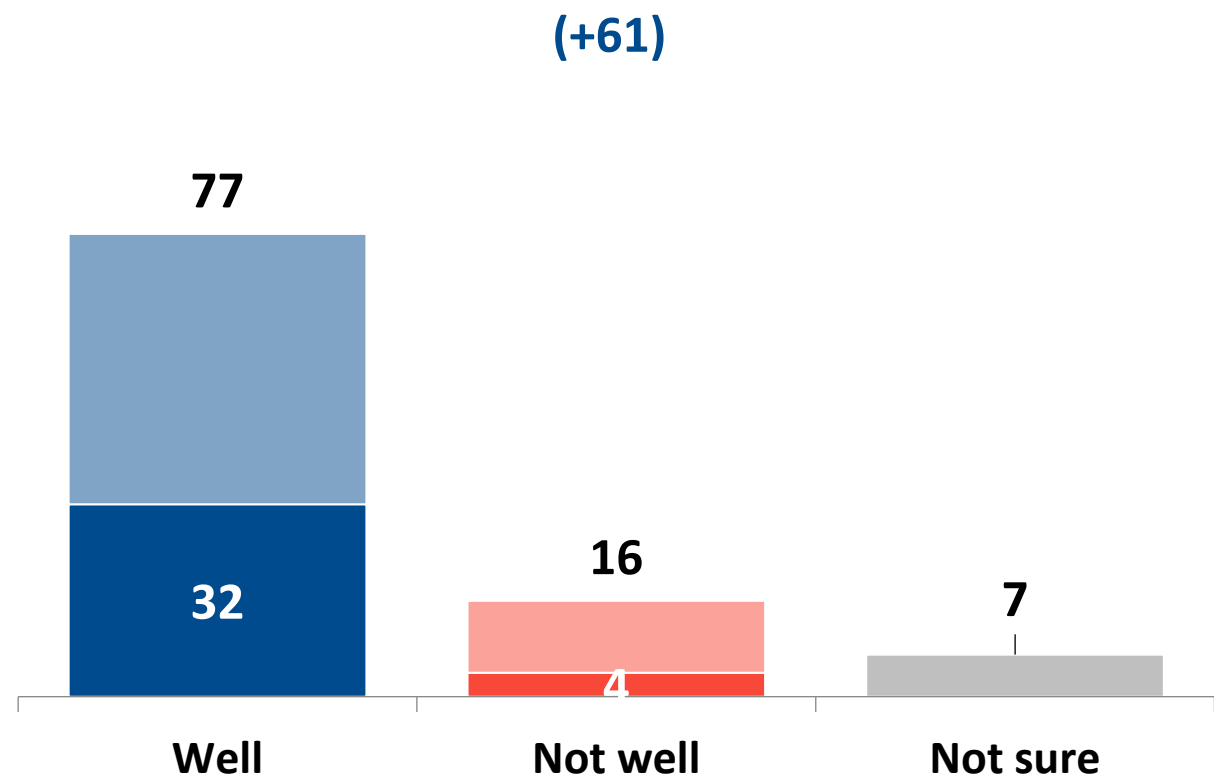

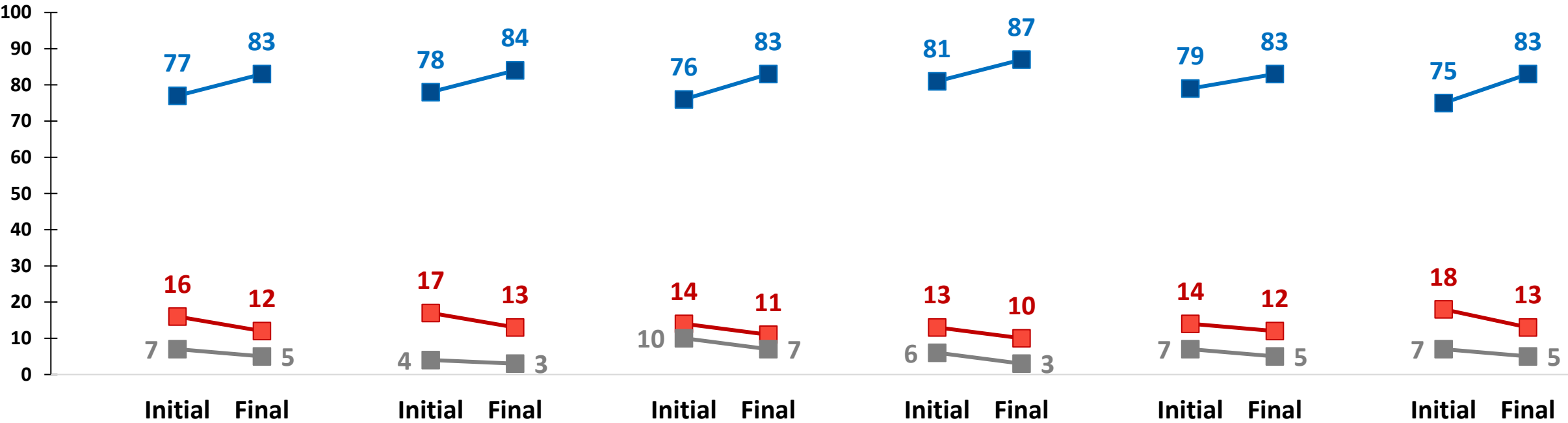

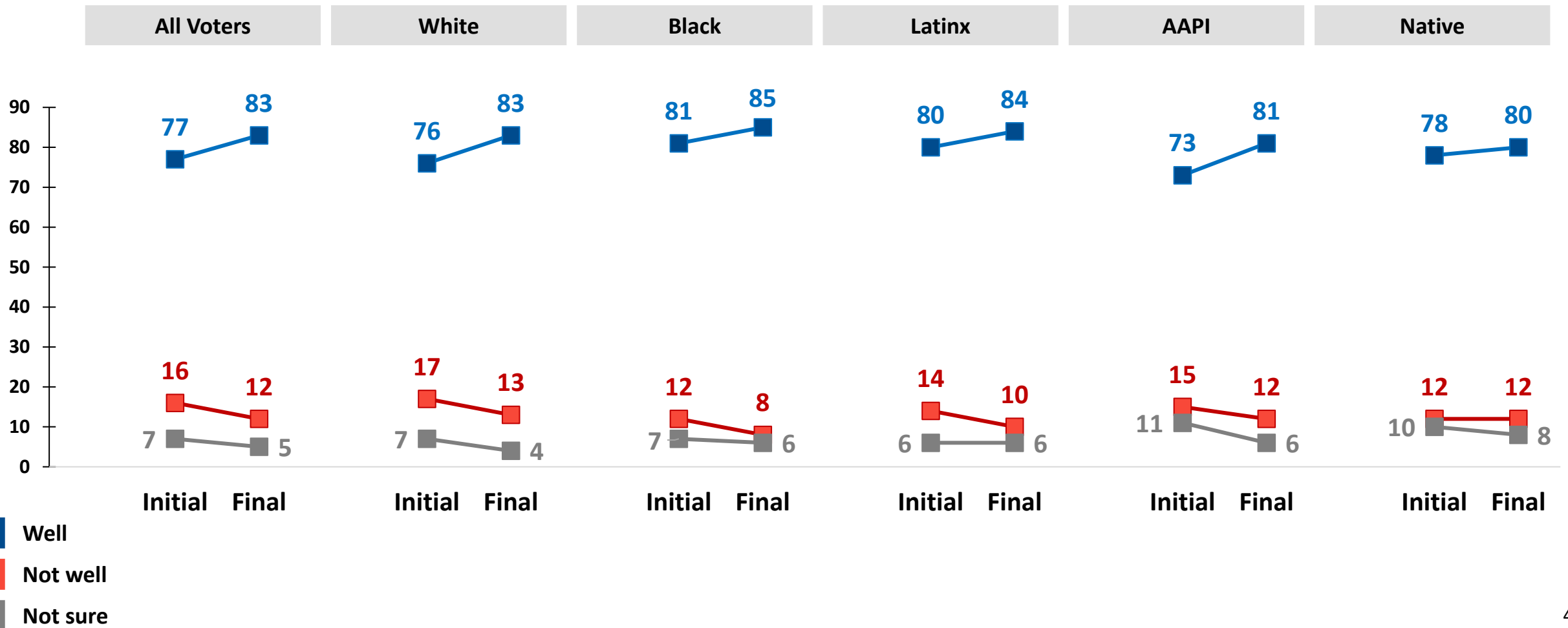

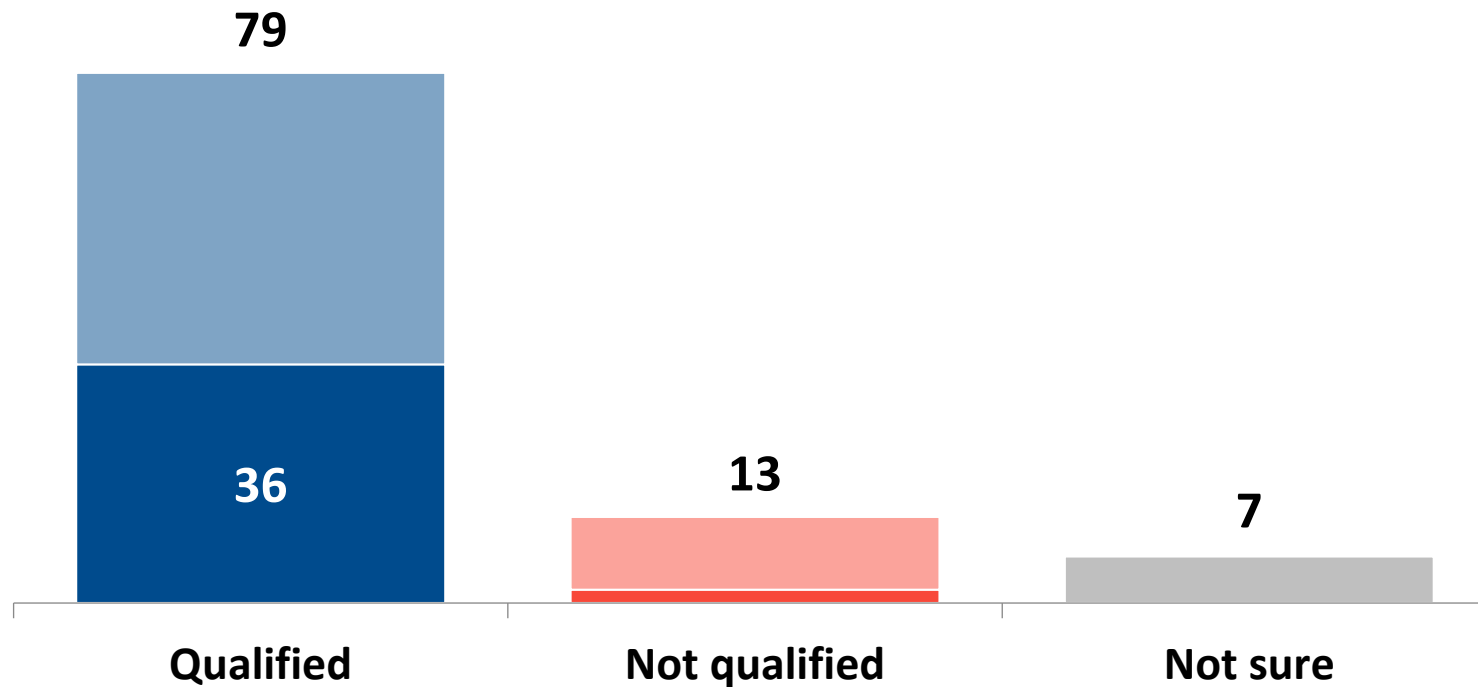
How well do you think serving as a state's lieutenant governor prepares someone to serve as the state's governor?

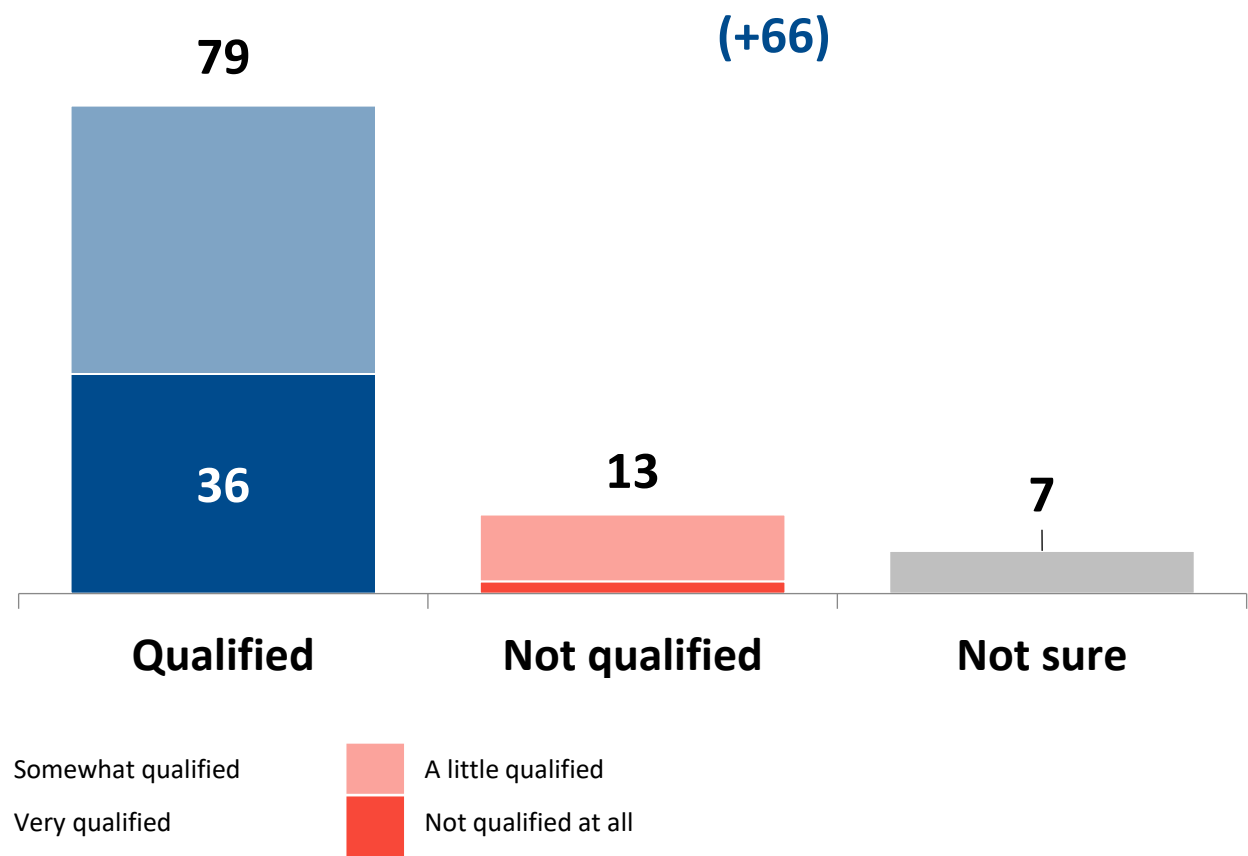

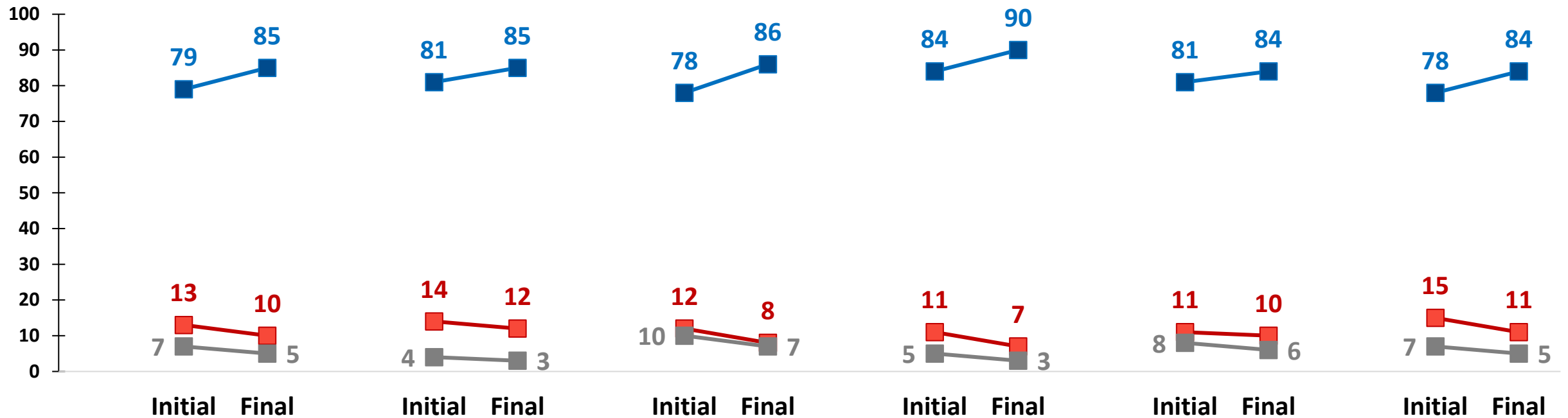

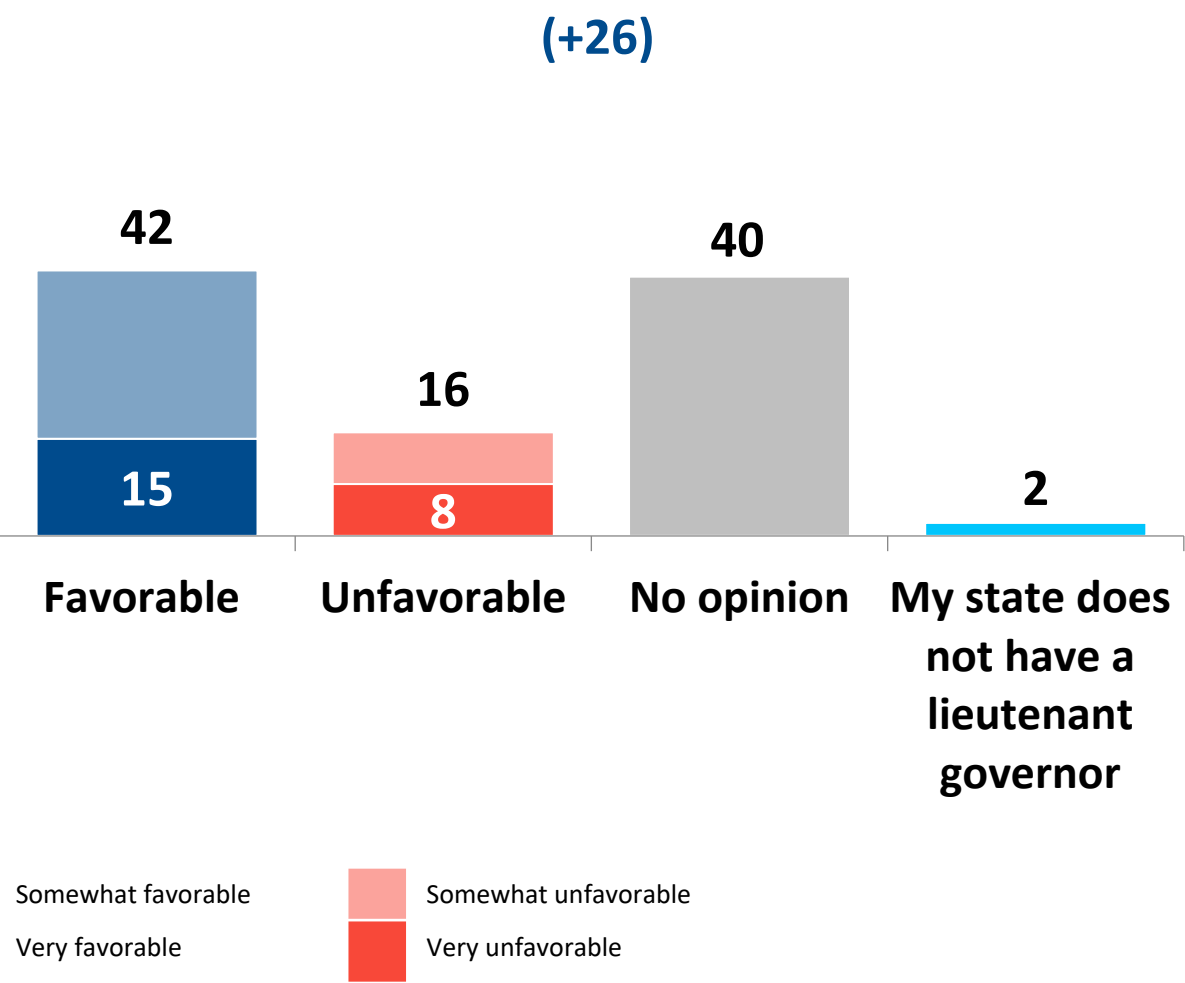

**Many participants do not have that much information about lieutenant governors and feel they do not hear from them. They say a good or successful lieutenant governor is often a bridge to and for the people – they listen to communities and report to the governor, oversee operations and make sure things work, and connect people to the governor.**

“I feel like it's important, but the problem is I'm finding **I don't really know much about ours. It's always hearing about the governor or the mayors.** It's not...so, it should be probably more important after what was just said with Abby.” – Woman from a state with a man LG

“I am not super politically involved. I try to keep up with basic things. **I would have been able to tell you the name of our governor, but while some of the other ladies were talking, I looked up the name of our lieutenant governor. I didn't have any idea who it was.** Turns out it is a woman, so I learned something new.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

“I put **advocate**, and I think that's just maybe **making sure that the laws are transparent**, you know, for the people, for the American people or the people that are in your area.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor

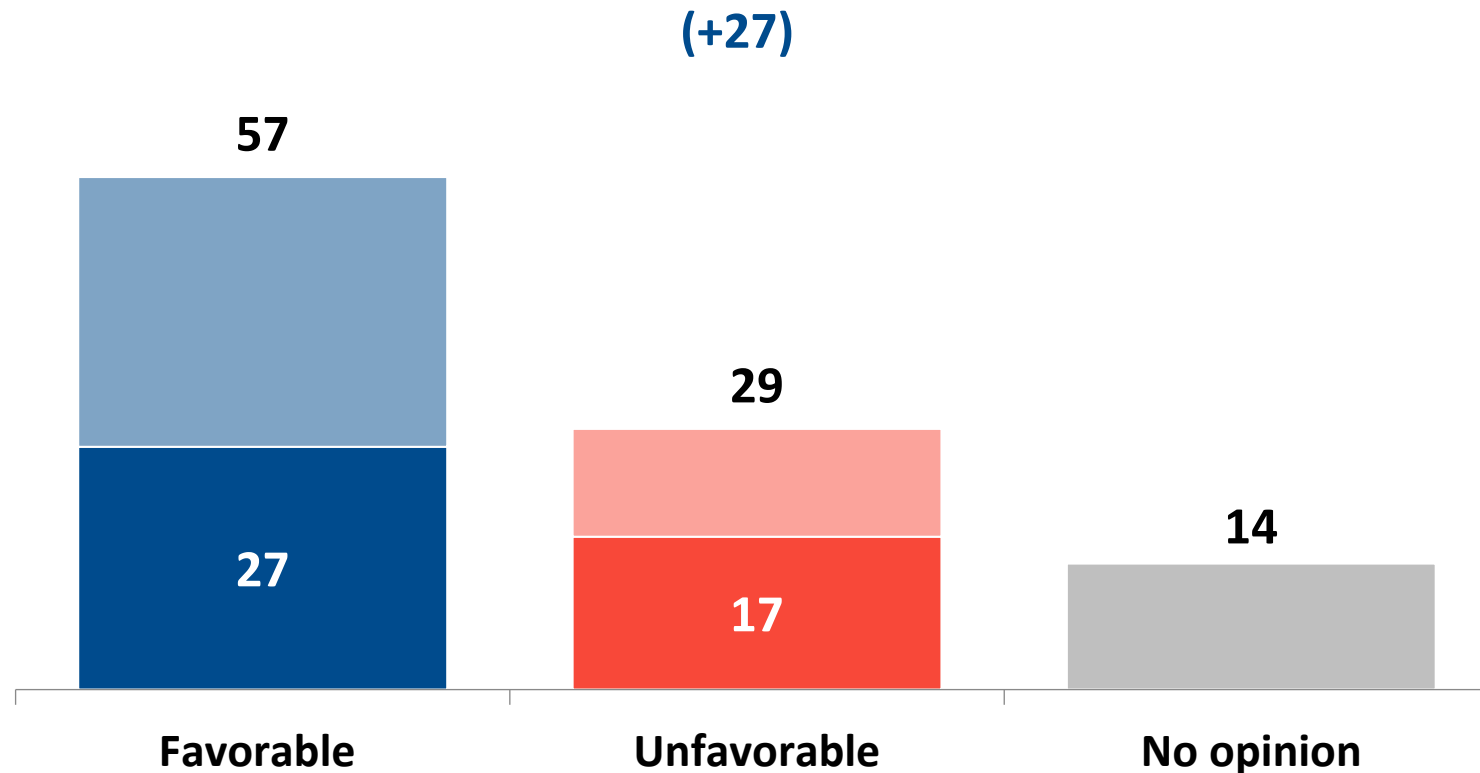

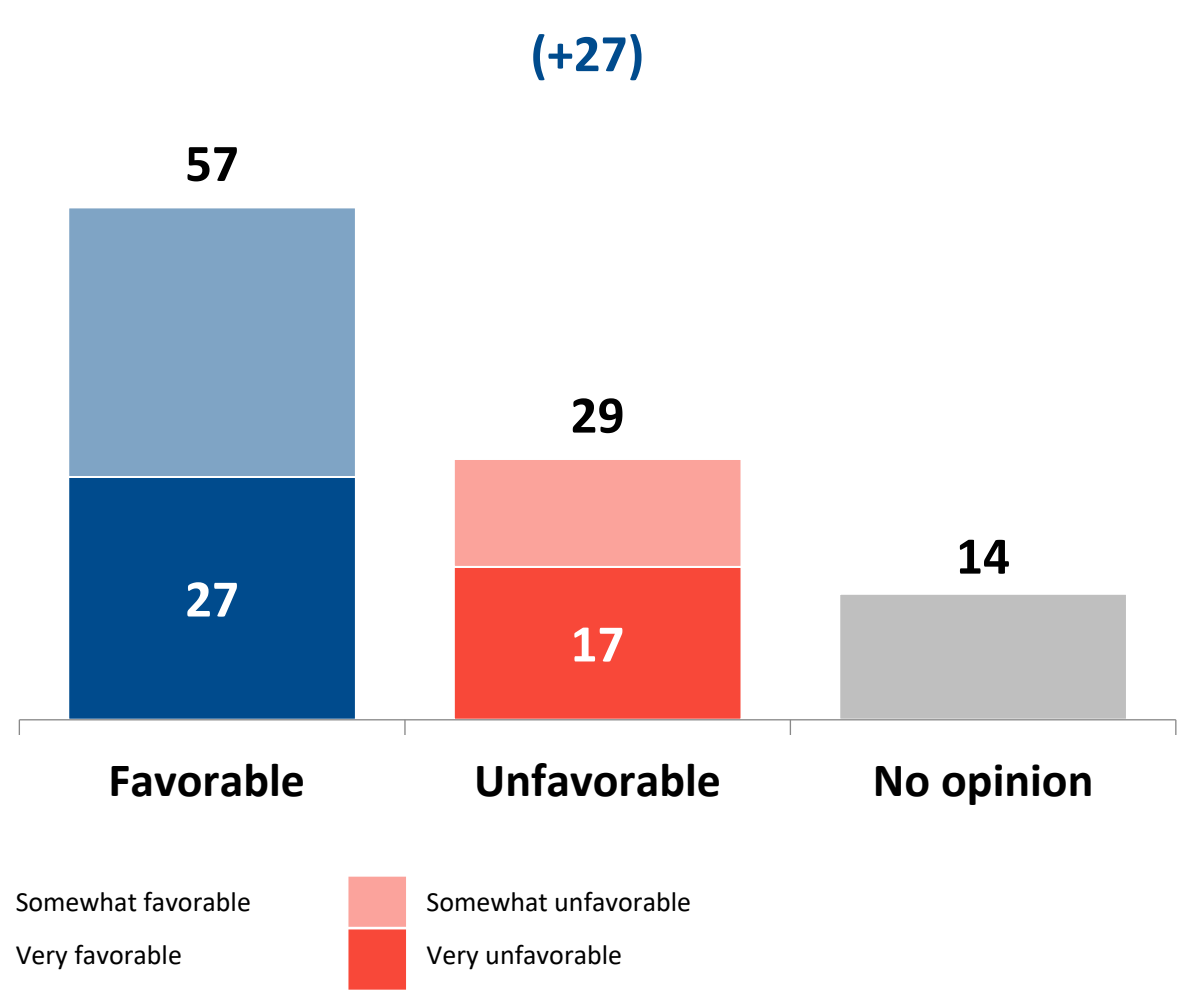

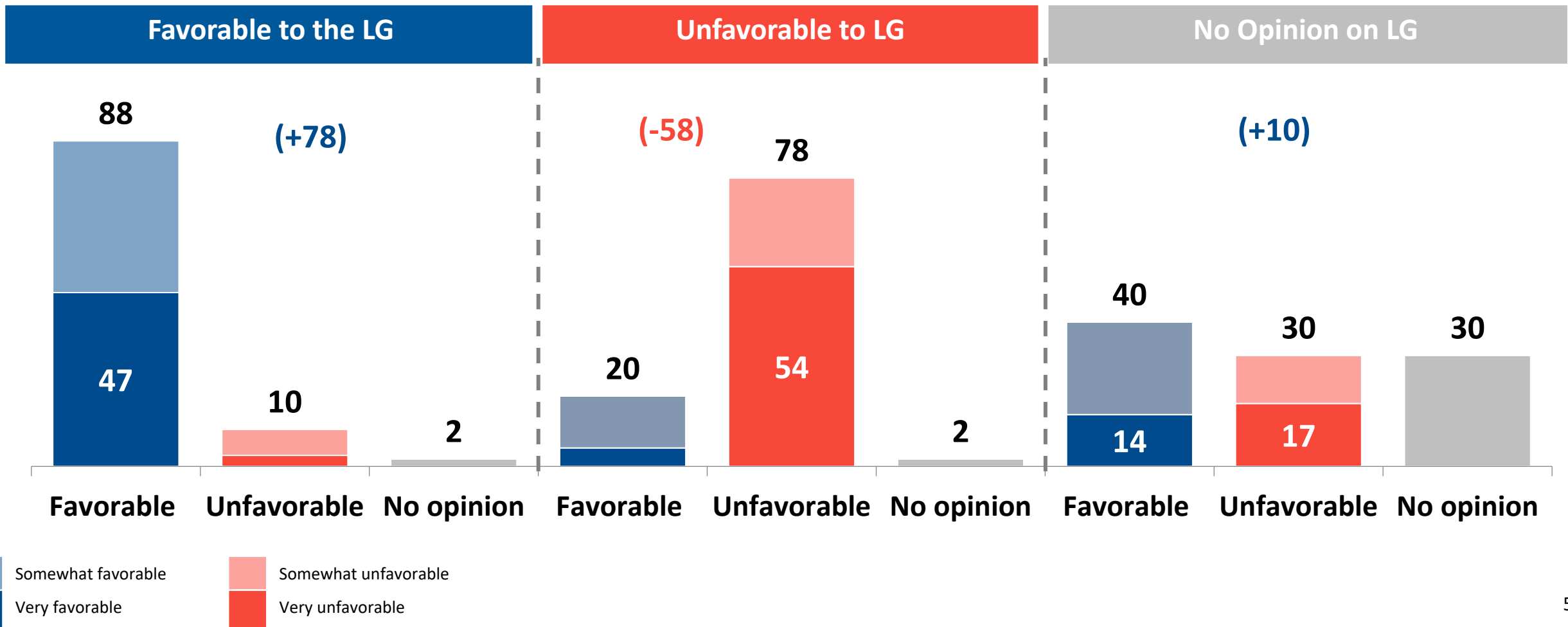

# Traits and Descriptors:





**When focus group participants were asked how they can tell whether a lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor is qualified to be governor, many said it would come down to their accomplishments and whether they have a proven track record.**

- “Looking at **what they helped accomplish.**” – Man in a state with a man LG
- “Yeah, **I would kind of like a track record of executive experience**, not necessarily business wise, but maybe if they were like a mayor or you know other levels of government where they have shown that they have been kind of competent leaders. Because the guys that come from...you know maybe they have their own special interests, like they are kind of looking out for themselves rather than what’s good for the state, or if they are just kind of looking at it as a stepping stone. Sometimes that is kind of a concern because I know there is a lot of like after they are done in government and they go in for like a lobby or they work for like, I don’t know. - “Definitely consistency. So, as we look back on their tenure...someone mentioned like consistency... have they been loyal to what they said and then what actually transpired and what happened. **Definitely a track record.**” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “**If you look at their track record as far as getting anything done**, any of those lists of things that you showed us, **how many did they incomplete and how many did they take care of?**” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor
- “**I would also be interested in what she did before she was lieutenant governor.** Like the woman that we have now, it's kind of like she appeared out of thin air and became lieutenant governor. Like I know, I mentioned the whole new to the state thing. **So, you know, has she been a state senator? Has she been a state rep? Has she worked in state government?**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

**It is also critical to understand whether a lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor interacts with, understands, and spends time with the community they represent. Other experience matters as well.**

- “I think it comes down... I am sorry. **I think it comes down with the experience they have and interaction with the community**, the states. And also, if they have, you know, like experience wise, I would say...and also, I can't decide that this governor is really capable enough. I don't really watch the news or this person is really, you know, unknown person or not really doing his job as far as always in the backstage.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “I would also say living in the state, and **understanding the population and the needs of the state.**” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “**Have they spent time in the community?**” - Woman from a state with a man LG
- “**I would also be interested in what she did before she was lieutenant governor.** Like the woman that we have now, it's kind of like she appeared out of thin air and became lieutenant governor. Like I know, I mentioned the whole new to the state thing. **So, you know, has she been a state senator? Has she been a state rep? Has she worked in state government?**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

Participants gave examples of things a lieutenant governor could accomplish that would be important to voters, which include accomplishments oriented toward getting things done and delivering results grounded in community. They can pass a law or bill, but it should be something that has a direct positive effect on the community, establishing relationships and being out in the public eye is seen as an accomplishment, and working on an important issue that is directly impacting the state or community is important.

The kind of accomplishments that participants find important for a lieutenant governor include...

Tangible accomplishments,  
like passing a bill or law

- “Uh huh, especially with bills. **Creating bills that are going to be for the people to help them in different areas** – gun violence and education and Medicaid and Medicare, health.” - Woman from a state with a man LG

Interaction with constituents  
and the community, and  
establishing relationships

- “I think maybe just **keeping in touch with constituents** and other people in the state with their wants and their needs and **being informed and maybe being out in the public and aware**. You know, stepping out of the office maybe and **getting in touch with voters and members of the state.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor

Delivering results on an issue  
that directly impacts the  
community

- “Right now, **we have a big problem with the fentanyl here in Arizona**. That's been a big issue, so they are even talking in the schools about it. And so, I think that **that would be a big issue for the lieutenant governor** to you know...I guess for your research that you are doing so that would be one of the things that might come up.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor

**Participants in the women groups acknowledged there are aspects of the role that are different for a woman lieutenant governor. This includes things like having to be more aware of your image, combatting more critiques from the public, and having to promote your accomplishments more than a man would have to. Participants in the men groups did not see a difference, though they themselves often hedged on whether the woman is qualified.**

### Women Groups

- “I think that a female running for governor might have to **promote herself more and her accomplishments** than a man might have to do, just to kind of **prove herself**. And women don't do as much self-promotion, typically so. That's the only real difference, I'd say.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “I think she may be **judged differently by the public**, by people in the public who have decided that women and men are different and need to be judged differently. But what we've talked about in what a lieutenant governor should do should apply to both men or women, whoever has the role?” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “I agree with that. That's basically what I was going to say too. I think it's a harder thing. **They can have the same message but because of it being a male versus female, I think people are more critical of her.** But I think their qualifications shouldn't make a difference. It should just be equal.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor

### Men Groups

- “**As long as they are qualified**, you know that's the thing. You know whatever gender or race, I mean the party is going to try to spin it to get votes. But for me, it's all about qualifications for the role, right.” – Man in a state with a man LG
- “I don't think so.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor
- “**I don't think there is too much difference in male and female these days.** Even if you did have an opinion that it is a sex thing, you'll probably get ran out of town or tortured.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor
- “**Even if somebody did have a problem, it is not safe to say it anymore. So, the world has changed.**” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor

Again, there was a clear distinction in the answers of participants between the women and men groups when it came to whether there was a difference among race. The women noted how the role is harder for women in general, but it becomes ten times harder when you are a woman of color, having to prove yourself more and work harder. Whereas the men did not see much of a difference when it comes to the race of the lieutenant governor. Any difference they did note had a more positive association, i.e., their being a woman of color would drive more campaign enthusiasm or earn them more votes from people of their same race.

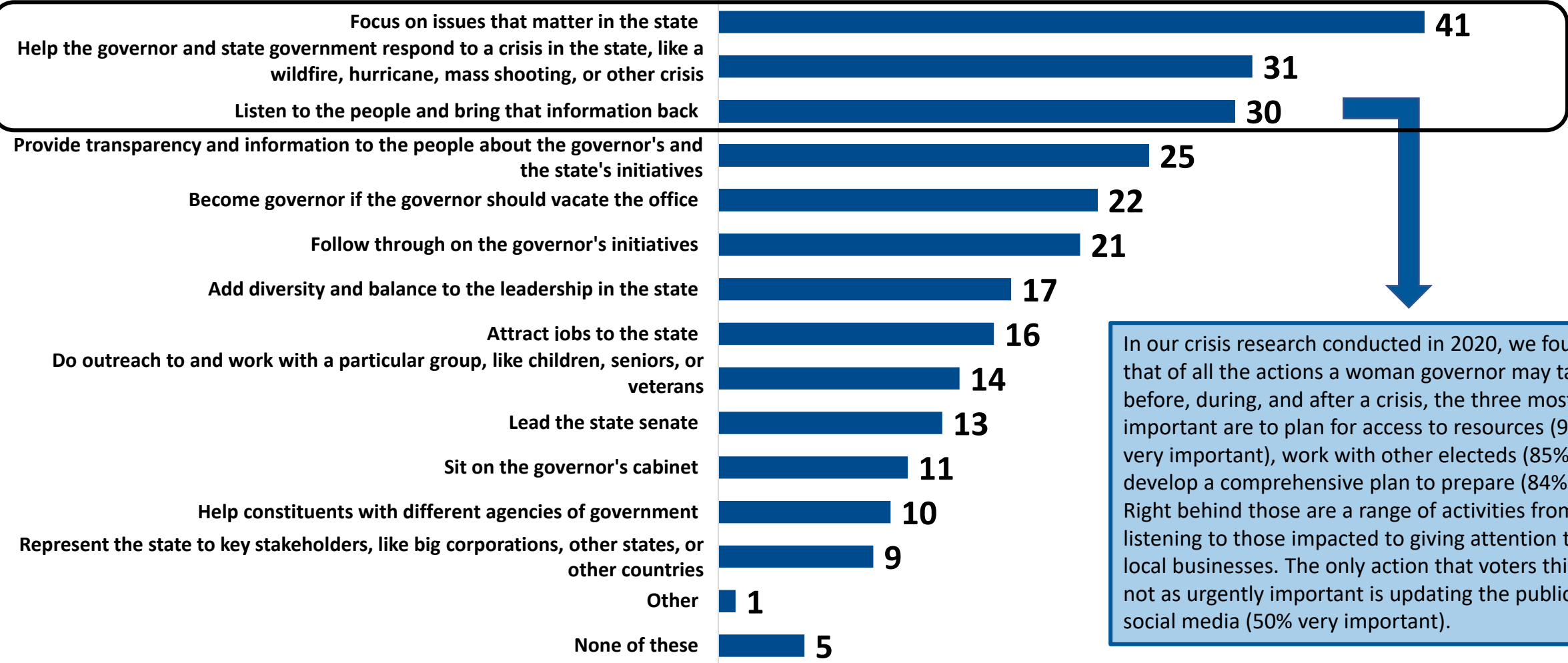
- “I think so. For a woman, and **if you're a white woman, then you have to prove yourself in that you're capable of doing it. But if you are coming from Asian, Black community, or Mexican, you have to work probably 10 times to prove yourself that you're capable more than white women.** So, there's kind of like **racism involved** and there's kind of like **more discrimination**, not because you're a woman but because of where your race is coming from.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “Yeah, I was just going to say that it would be hard enough with just being a woman, but you know...and I am just saying African American, **it would be even harder. You would have to work harder just to prove yourself and to whatever you are implementing, you would have to make sure that you bring it home.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor

## Men Groups

- “Well, the same thing. I mean it can be, as I said, a Vietnamese refugee and Hispanic woman, a Black man, **it doesn't matter who it is, I am not distinguishing among races or ethnicity.**” – Man in a state with a man LG
- “Yeah, it would like maybe drive some enthusiasm, you know kind of **like when Obama was elected.** Sort of that kind of...**a lot of that energy beyond him just being a good speaker and a good candidate, it was wow, we are going to really do something by electing an African American or just any non-white male president.** So, yeah, it's not the qualification, but it can definitely drive some kind of fashion, I guess... In the campaign, yeah.” – Man in a state with a man LG
- “Well, **it shouldn't matter, but it probably does.**” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor
- “**It is a higher chance you are going to vote for one of your own.**” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor

**Voters think the three most important roles for a woman lieutenant governor to play are focusing on issues that matter in the state, helping the governor and state government respond to a crisis in the state, like a wildfire, hurricane, mass shooting, or other crisis, and listening to the people and bringing that information back. The least important roles to voters are sitting on the governor’s cabinet, helping constituents with different agencies of government, and representing the state to key stakeholders, like big corporations, other states, or other countries.**

In our crisis research conducted in 2020, we found that of all the actions a woman governor may take before, during, and after a crisis, the three most important are to plan for access to resources (90% very important), work with other electeds (85%), and develop a comprehensive plan to prepare (84%). Right behind those are a range of activities from listening to those impacted to giving attention to local businesses. The only action that voters think is not as urgently important is updating the public via social media (50% very important).



**In the focus groups, the three roles that a lieutenant governor may play in state government that stand out to participants the most are becoming the governor if the governor should vacate the office, helping the governor and state government respond to a crisis, and following up on the governor's initiatives. Again, we see a common theme that being able to respond to a crisis is important to voters.**



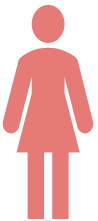

- “Three. Only because that’s all that stands out in regard to like the other items. I wasn’t even aware that the LG was responsible for that, if they are. All I know that he replaces the governor if he or she cannot perform his or her duties.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “Yeah, I think for number 12, it’s very critical for us now because it seems as though we are in crisis mode every single week. So, I would want to know that if number three could happen that the LG is able to be responsive in crises and you know make good decisions as far as on the fly and be able to represent our state accurately and get the funding or support of what we need. I’d like to see them in that spot. I think it’s too often that they are just looked at as a sidekick and not someone that we see can make impactful decisions.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “Follow up on the governor's initiatives. He/she should support the governor.” – Man from a state with a man LG

**When asked if there are any roles they think a woman lieutenant governor would handle better than a man, some of the women say all the roles, while some of the men say there is no difference between gender. Other men participants did say that women may be better with working and interacting with children in the community, and some women participants said something similar, that a woman lieutenant governor would be better at doing outreach with people and children because they are more nurturing and compassionate.**

"The only thing that I might dare to suggest that a woman might be able to do a little better is number 13. Women tend to be more nurturing, more compassionate, so maybe doing person to person outreach or to small groups or even larger groups might be a little easier and come more naturally for a woman." – *Woman from a state with a woman LG*



"I don't see that. I think gender shouldn't have anything to do with it. Whether it is a male or a female, they should be able to handle it. It's the job they took and they ran for that office and they should be able to handle it." – *Man from a state with a man LG*



"All of them." – *Woman from a state with a man LG*

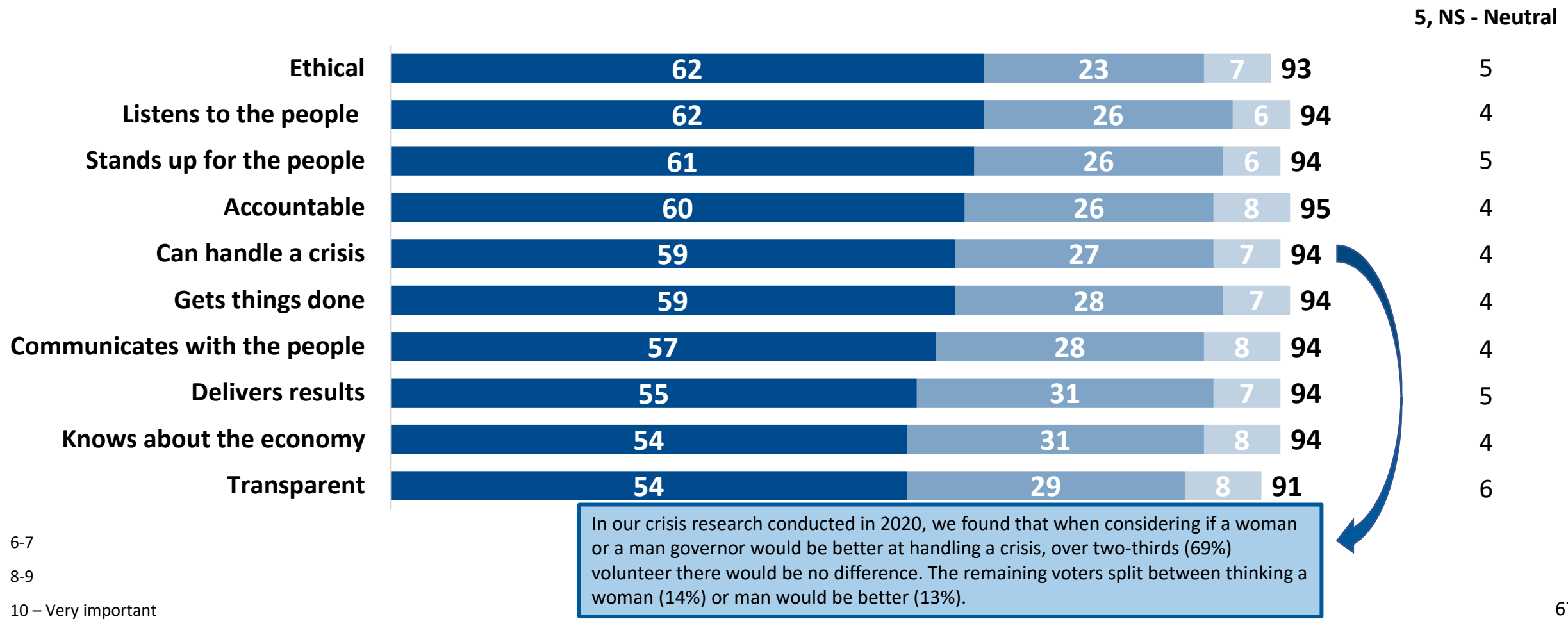


"I would say like children's outreach would be better. It helps the economy just kind of traditionally. Just a female LG would be better at that just because like...I don't know. It's like the thing that's built into society, like a female being friendly to children is like normal whereas a male being friendly to children that are not related to him seems somewhat like, I don't know." – *Man from a state with a man LG*



# Nearly universally, voters rate these qualities as important to earning their vote, but over six in ten rate being ethical, listening to the people, and standing up for the people as being very important.

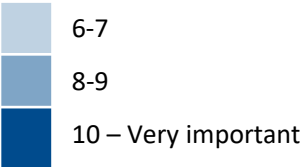
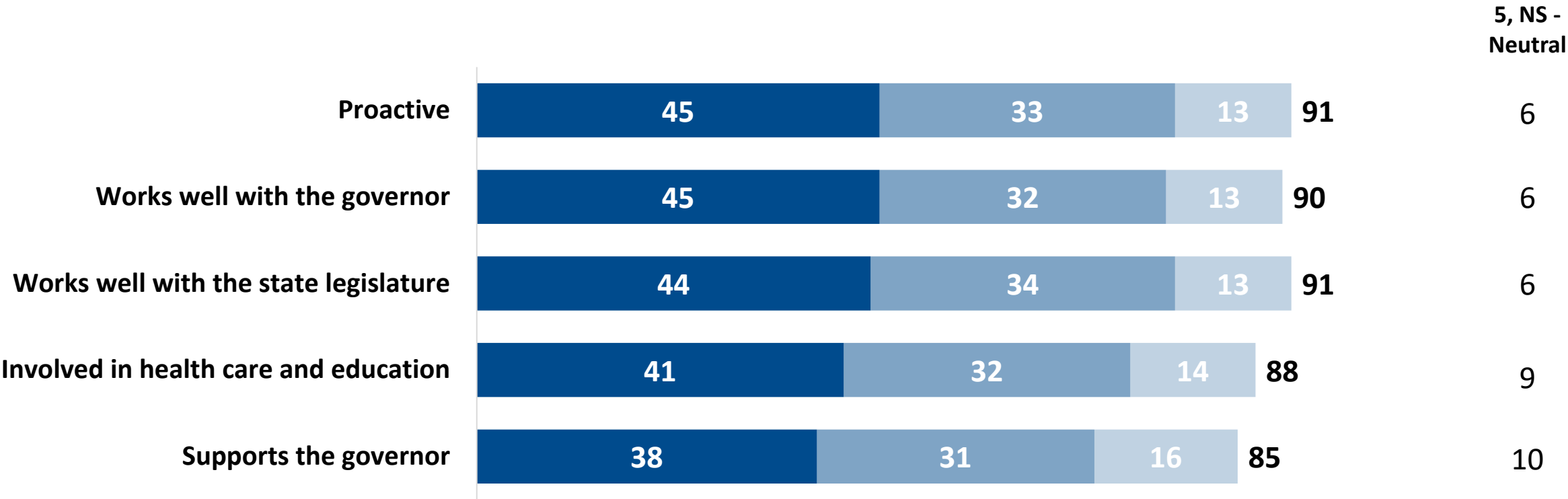
Compared to their counterparts, women and voters over 50 rate these qualities with more intense importance than men and voters under 50. There is a near 20-point gap between voters under and over 50 with how intensely important a lieutenant governor being ethical is to earning their vote. Standing up for the people and listening to the people are the most important qualities for voters under 50, Black voters, and Native/Indigenous voters. For Latinx voters, listening to the people and getting things done are most important and for AAPI voters it is listening to the people and being able to handle a crisis. Independents think being accountable is the most important quality for a woman lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor to have.

**Qualities that are oriented toward their relationship and interaction with the governor and institutions are included in a bottom tier of importance for a woman lieutenant governor who is running to be the next governor to have. Although these qualities land in a bottom tier, at least 85% of voters rate these qualities as important.**

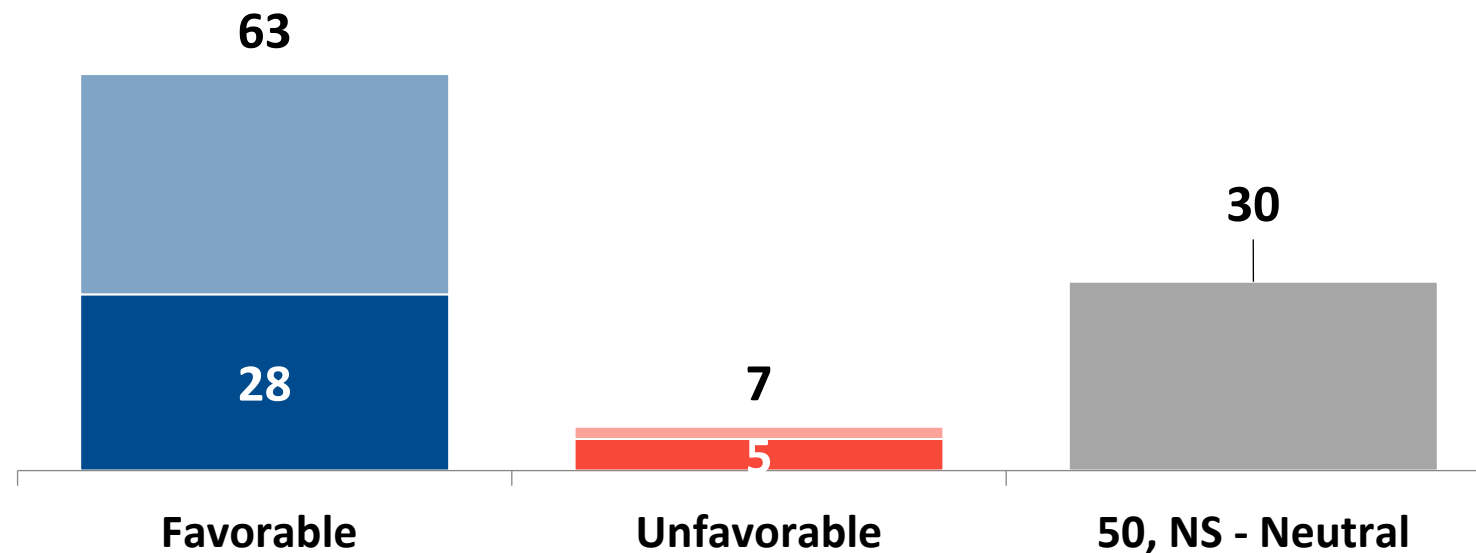

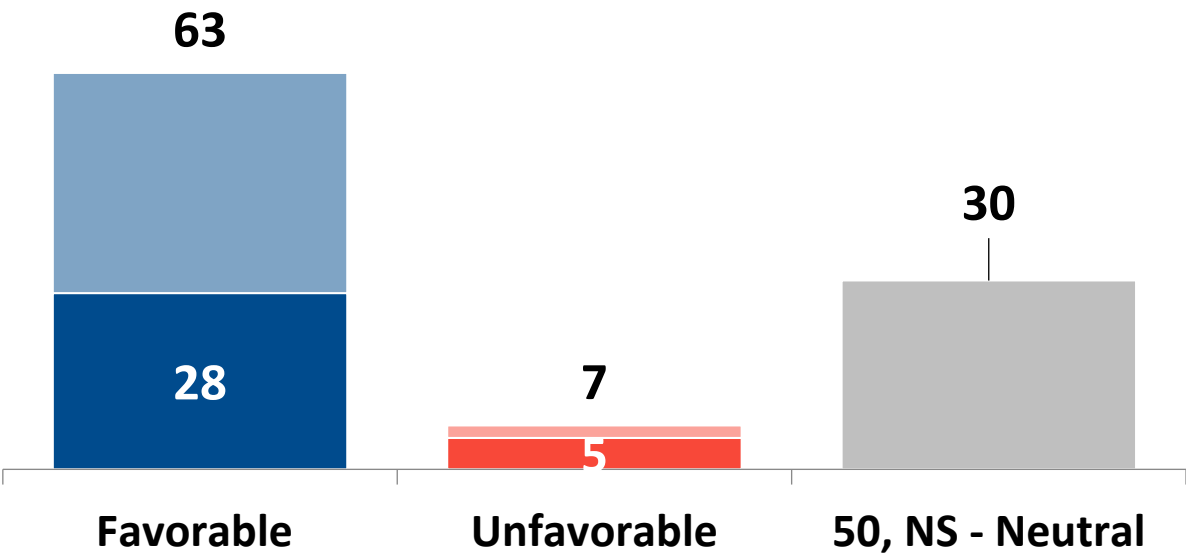

All the statements from the governor about the lieutenant governor make about two thirds of voters or more think the white woman lieutenant governor is qualified to become the next governor. The three top testing statements are about follow-through and finishing the job, being the most effective LG in the country, and honesty.

Ratings are similar across subgroups. The statement about the woman lieutenant governor being truthful and honest works the best for men and Native American/Indigenous voters. Women and Independents rank statements about her being the person to get the job done and being one of the most effective lieutenant governors in the country equally. Democrats and Black voters think the statement about her being one of the most effective in the country makes her most qualified to become the next governor. Latinx and AAPI voters like follow-through, efficacy, preeminence, and respected team member statements the best. Compared to their counterparts, AAPI voters feel less intense about these statements, which is a typical pattern for AAPI voters.

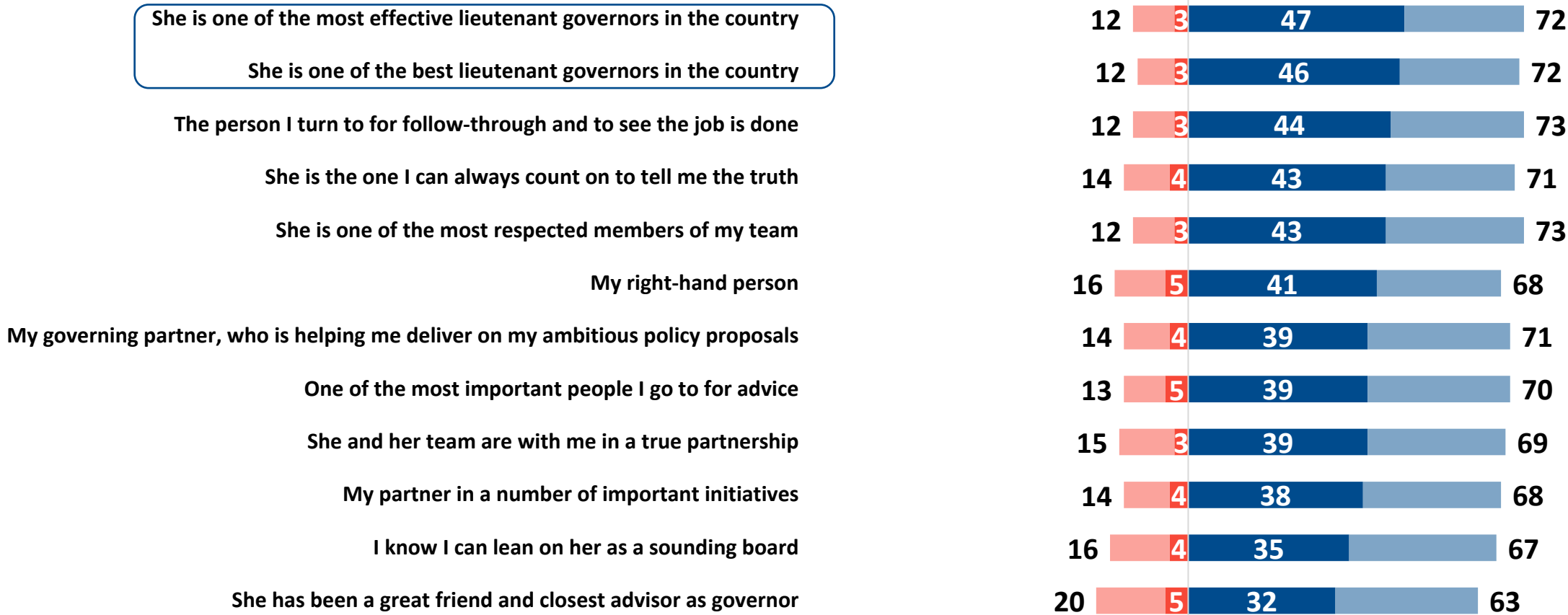

Gender, partisanship, and race influence how voters sort these statements. Across gender and party ID, voters rate efficacy and being one of the best as their top or among the top statements. The statement about her team being with the governor in a true partnership also works best among Latinx voters. Democrats, Independents, and Republicans have a large top tier of statements and all like the description of a highly respected team member. Republicans and AAPI voters think the governor saying she is his right-hand person makes her most qualified. Native American/Indigenous voters, AAPI voters, Republicans, Independents, and men think her being someone the governor can always count on to tell them the truth makes her most qualified.

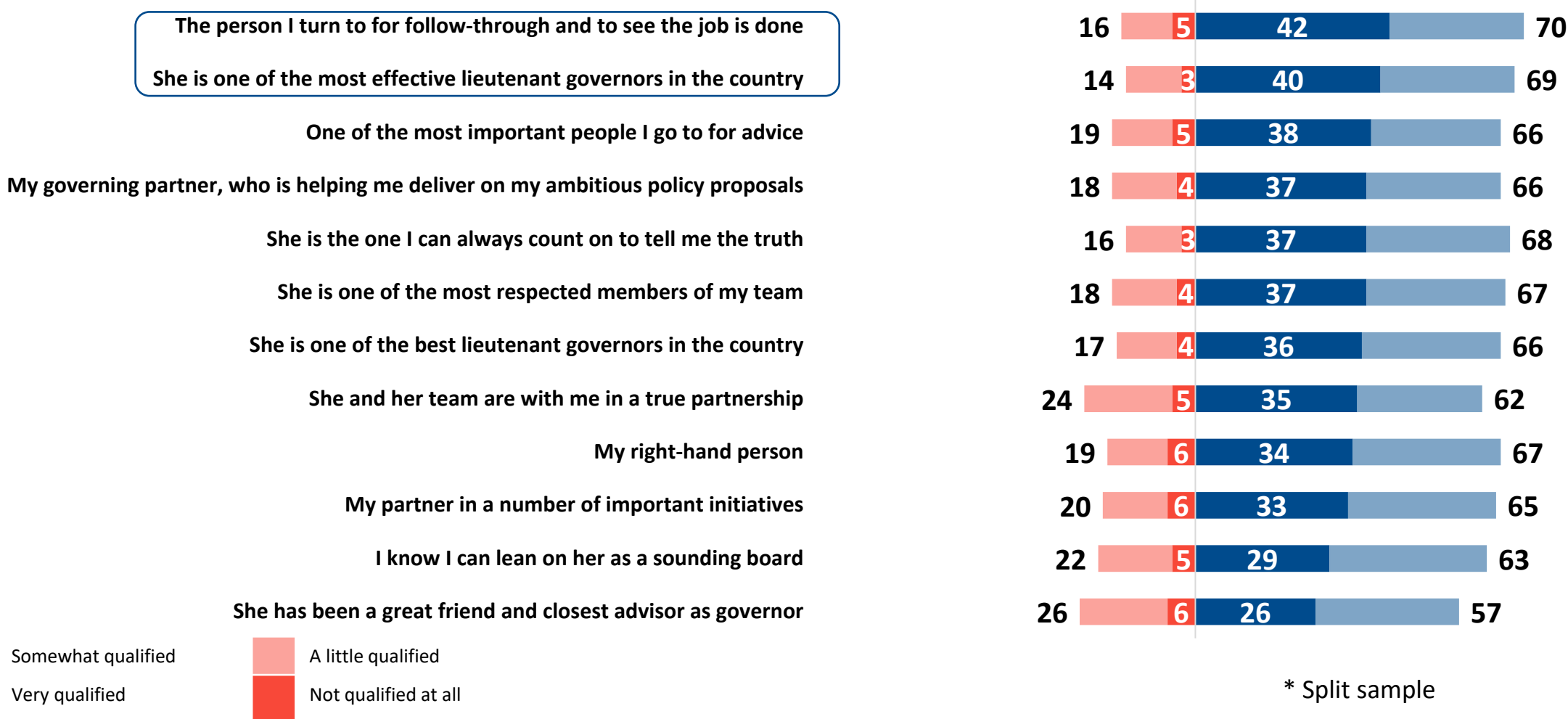

At least four in ten voters think statements about the Latina woman lieutenant governor being someone the governor can turn to for follow-through and to see the job is done, and being one of the most effective in the country makes her very qualified to become the next governor. Only a quarter think being a great friend and closest advisor to the governor makes her very qualified, and an equal amount say it does not make her qualified.

Across demographic subgroups, voters think the Latina lieutenant governor being someone the governor can turn to for follow-through and to see the job is done makes her most qualified, except for Native/Indigenous voters. Black voters think her being someone they can always count on to tell them the truth makes her most qualified, while statements about her being one of the most respected members of their team and one of the most important people they go to for advice are the most likely to make Native American/Indigenous voters say she is very qualified to become the next governor. Republicans also like the advisor and respected team member statements.

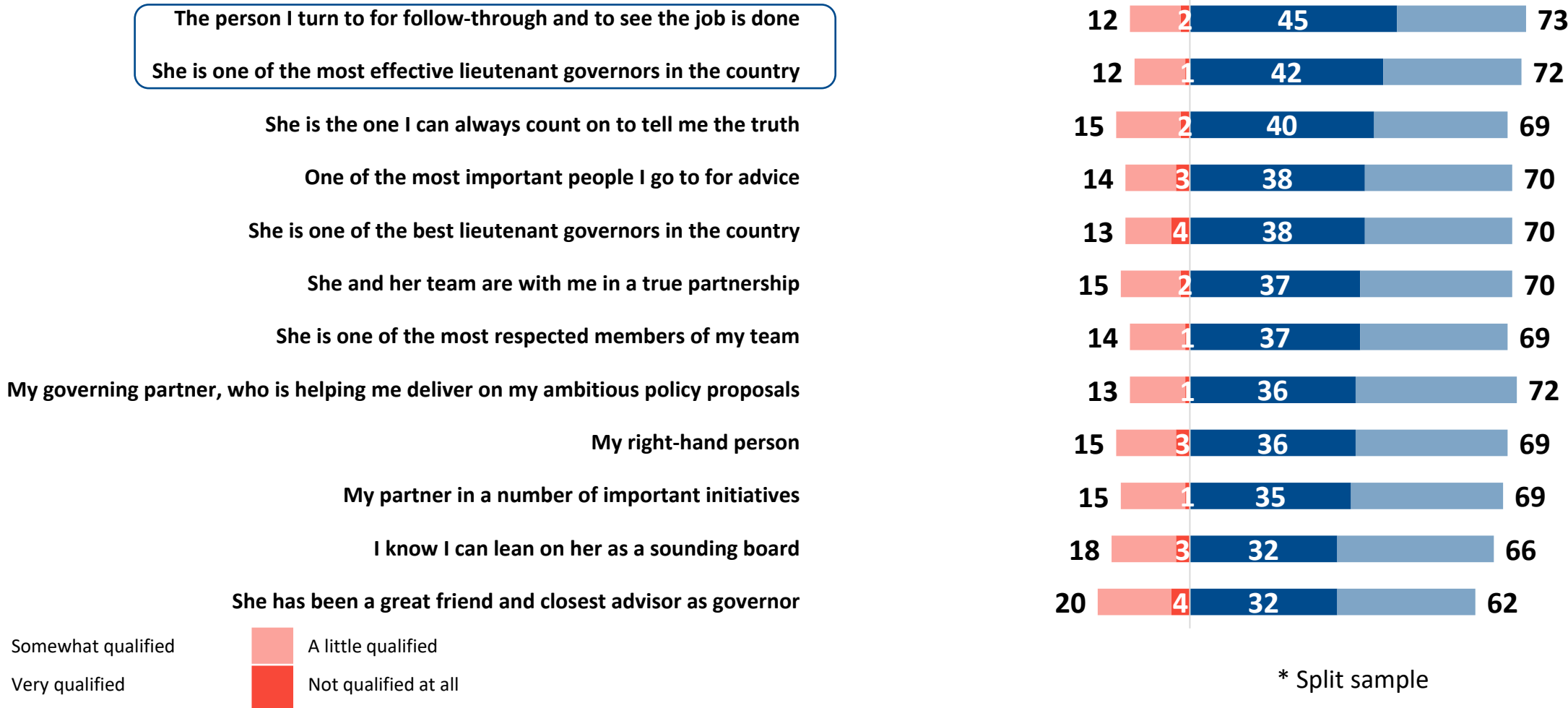

At least four in ten voters think statements about the AAPI woman lieutenant governor being the person the governor turns to for follow-through and to see the job is done, her being one of the most effective lieutenant governors in the country, and being the one the governor can always count on to tell them the truth make her very qualified to become the next governor.

**Almost every subgroup has follow-through as a top statement – except for Native voters. Democrats, Independents, Black, and Latinx voters rate the statement about efficacy equally high, and this is the top statement for Native American/Indigenous voters. Independents, Republicans, Black, and AAPI voters also like truth-telling. And Independents, Republicans, and AAPI voters like the important advisor role as well. Republicans put true partnership and most respected team member in the top tier. 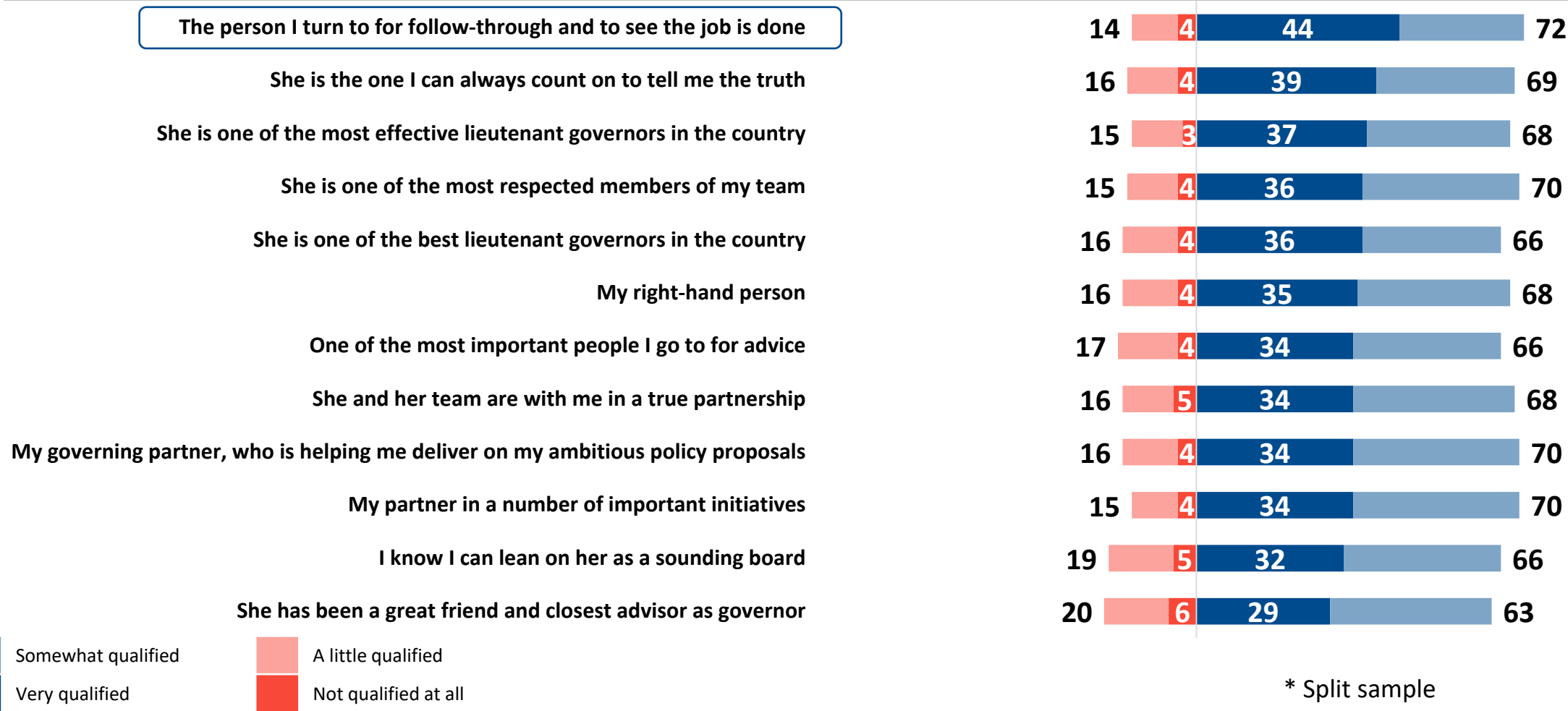

Across demographic subgroups, except for AAPI voters, voters think the statement about the woman lieutenant governor being someone the governor turns to for follow-through and to see the job is done makes her most qualified. The top statement for AAPI voters is truth-telling. Democrats and Native voters also rate truth-telling high. Democrats like the right-hand person role as well. Black and Latinx voters rate being one of the best LGs high, and Latinx voters also respond to being a highly respected team member.

The statements about the woman lieutenant governor’s relationship with the governor rank similarly across the races of the women except for the Black lieutenant governor whose top testing statements are about being one of the most effective and best lieutenant governors in the country. For the Native lieutenant governor, being someone the governor can always count on to tell them the truth is slightly more intensely important than being one of the most effective in the country. Compared to the other women lieutenant governors, the statement about being one of the most respected members of their team makes the Black woman more qualified. A similar yet opposite phenomenon emerges for the Latina woman compared to the other women lieutenant governors, being a great friend and closest advisor does not make her as intensely qualified as the others.

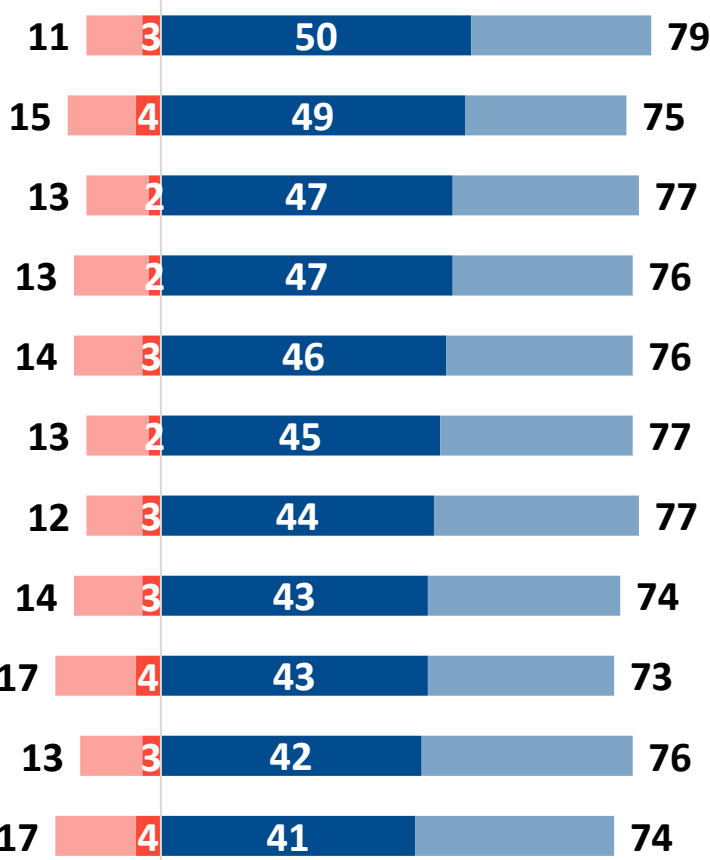

**Women, voters across party, and white, AAPI, and Native voters respond well to problem-solving. Women, Independents, Republicans, white, Latinx, and Native voters rate prioritizing meeting people across the state. The statement about how she delivered major improvements in job skills and education works best for men, Democrats, and Black voters, while the statement about fighting for seniors and children resonates with Democrats, Independents, and Black voters. The statement about her being a strong advocate for different communities works best for Black, Latinx, and Native American/Indigenous voters. Men and Independents also like the focus on small businesses.**

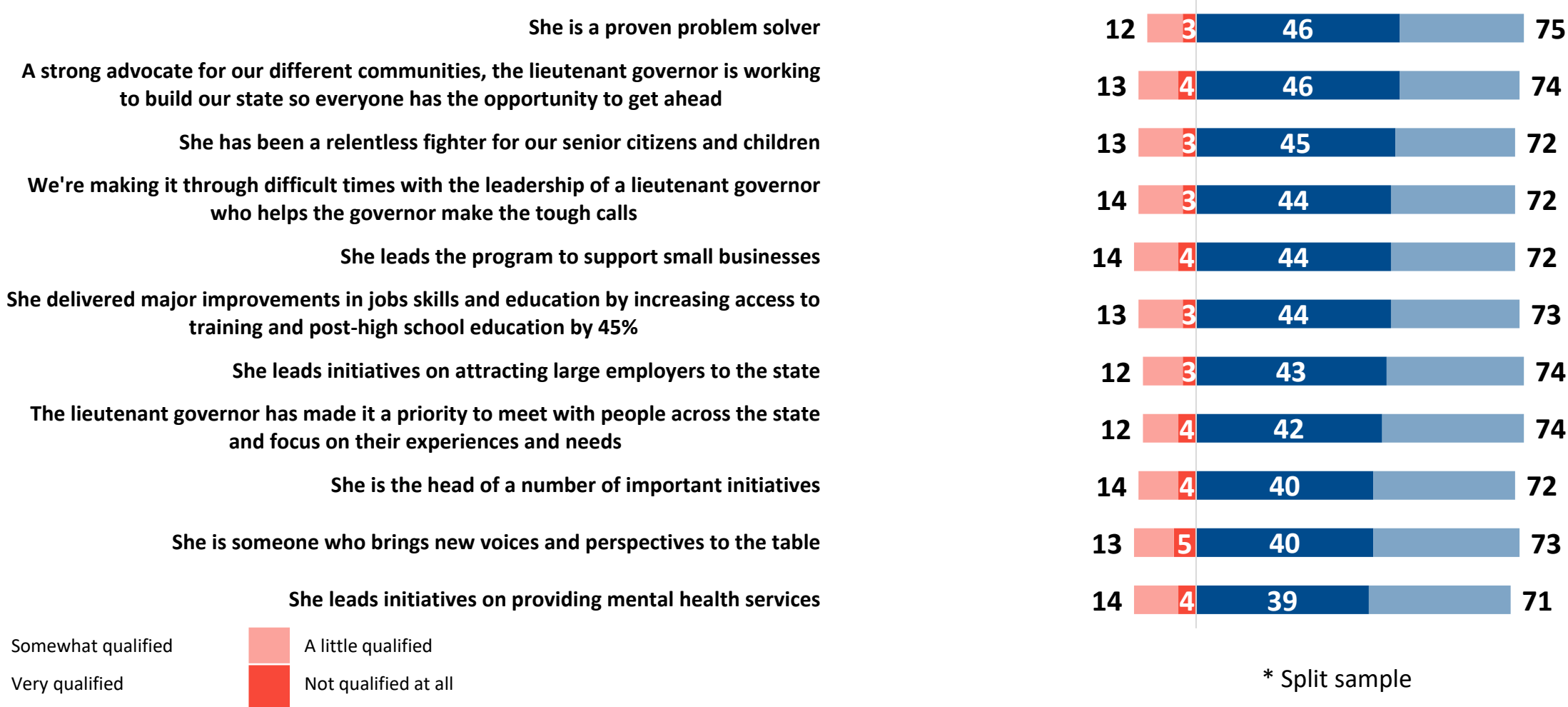

There is little difference between the rating of each statement made about a Black woman LG, and all receive at least four in ten who give it very qualified ratings. Again, there is little difference between the rating of each statement for a Latina woman LG, but statements about the woman lieutenant governor being a relentless fighter for our senior citizens and children, being a problem solver, and increasing access to job training and education rise to the top. Notably, leading the program to support small business is rated lowest in how qualified it makes her to become the next governor, which is something we have seen in other data.

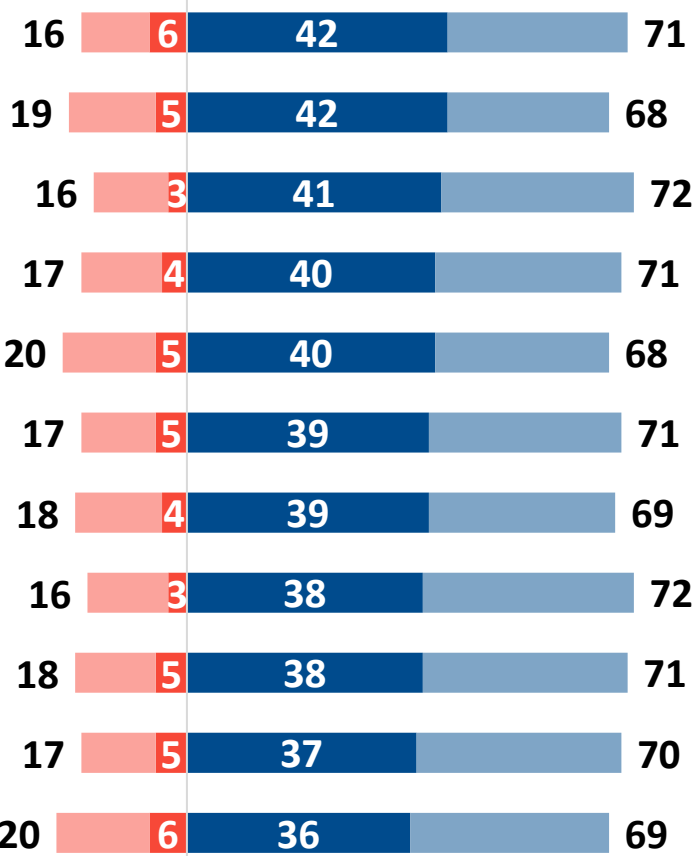

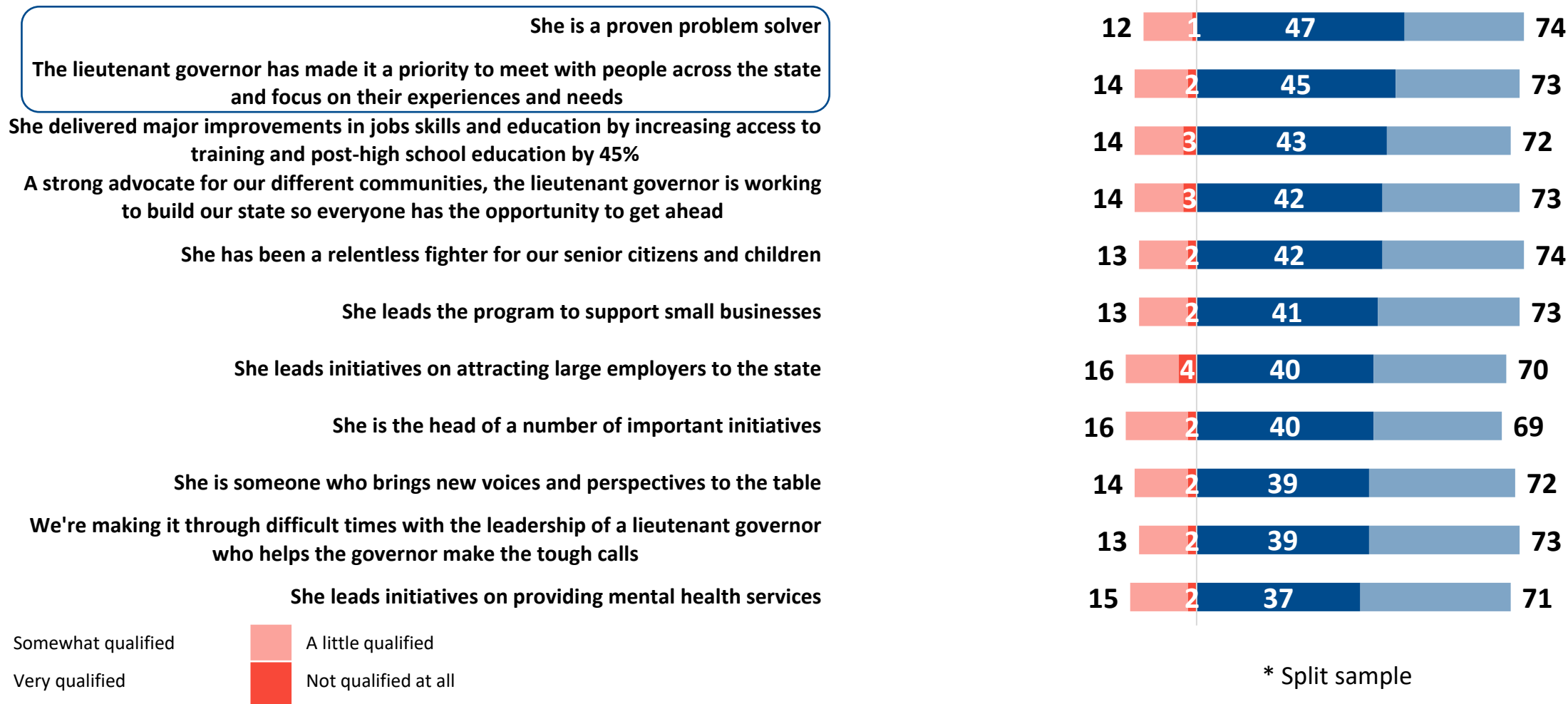

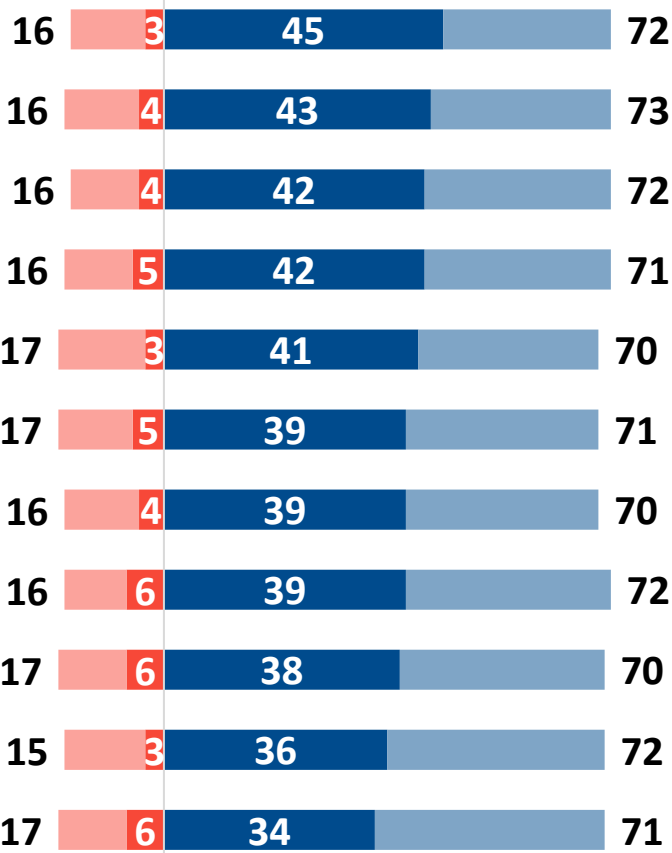

**The statement about being a proven problem solver rates the highest for all the women lieutenant governors, along with being a strong advocate for our different communities for the Black woman LG and being a relentless fighter for our senior citizens and children for the Latina LG. Compared to the other women lieutenant governors, the statement about leading the program to support small businesses doesn't work as well for the Latina and Native women as it does for the others. Similarly, the statement about leading initiatives on attracting large employers to the state also does not work as well for the Native woman as it does for the other women lieutenant governors.**

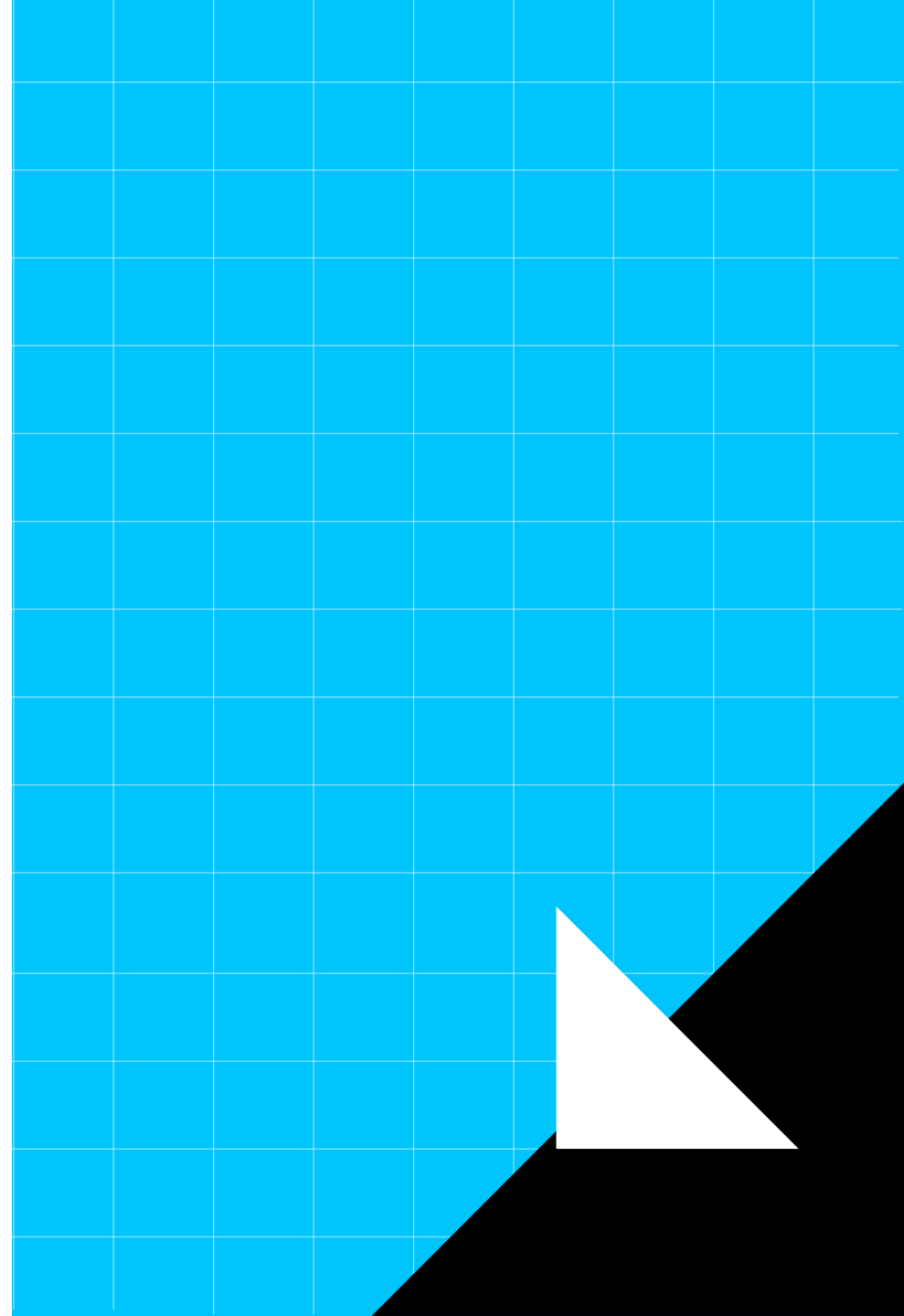

- "If there's anything that would be a job for problem solving, it would be something in the government. **So, somebody who can look at different angles and decide what is the best way to solve the problem with people in mind. And I think that she's going to be...You know the fact that she thinks concretely and also abstractly in creative ways that we've had to do such as COVID, I think that's important that they have that as part of their repertoire because I think they'd be facing a lot as lieutenant governor [C].**" – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- "**Solving problems gets things done [C].**" – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor
- "**I said it was short and to the point [C].**" – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor
- "**Children need someone to advocate for them, and anybody who's willing to fight for seniors, to me, it just says a lot about your character [why K is strongest].**" – Man in a state with a man LG
- "Yeah, I like that. Yeah, **it's something that shows about what their values are and often kind of a forgotten part of you know a political kind of landscape, you know, especially seniors.** They are people we kind of neglect in our society, generally, compared to other kinds of cultures [why K is strongest]." – Man in a state with a man LG

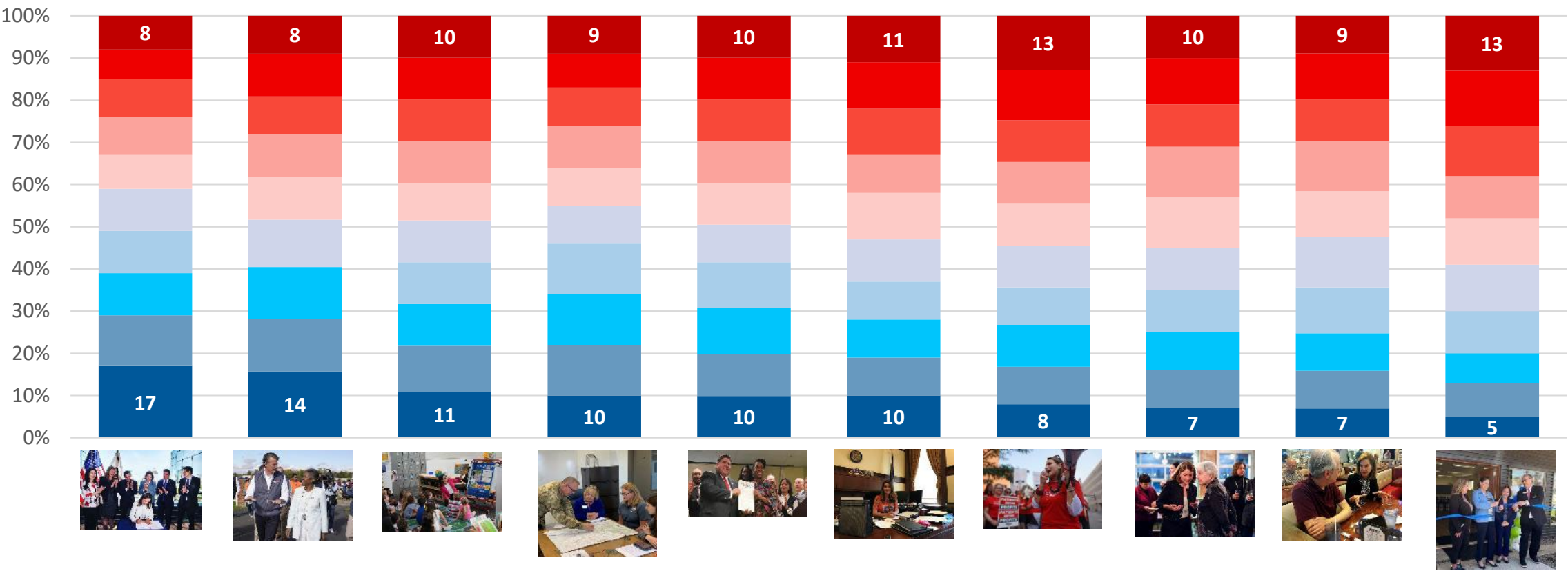

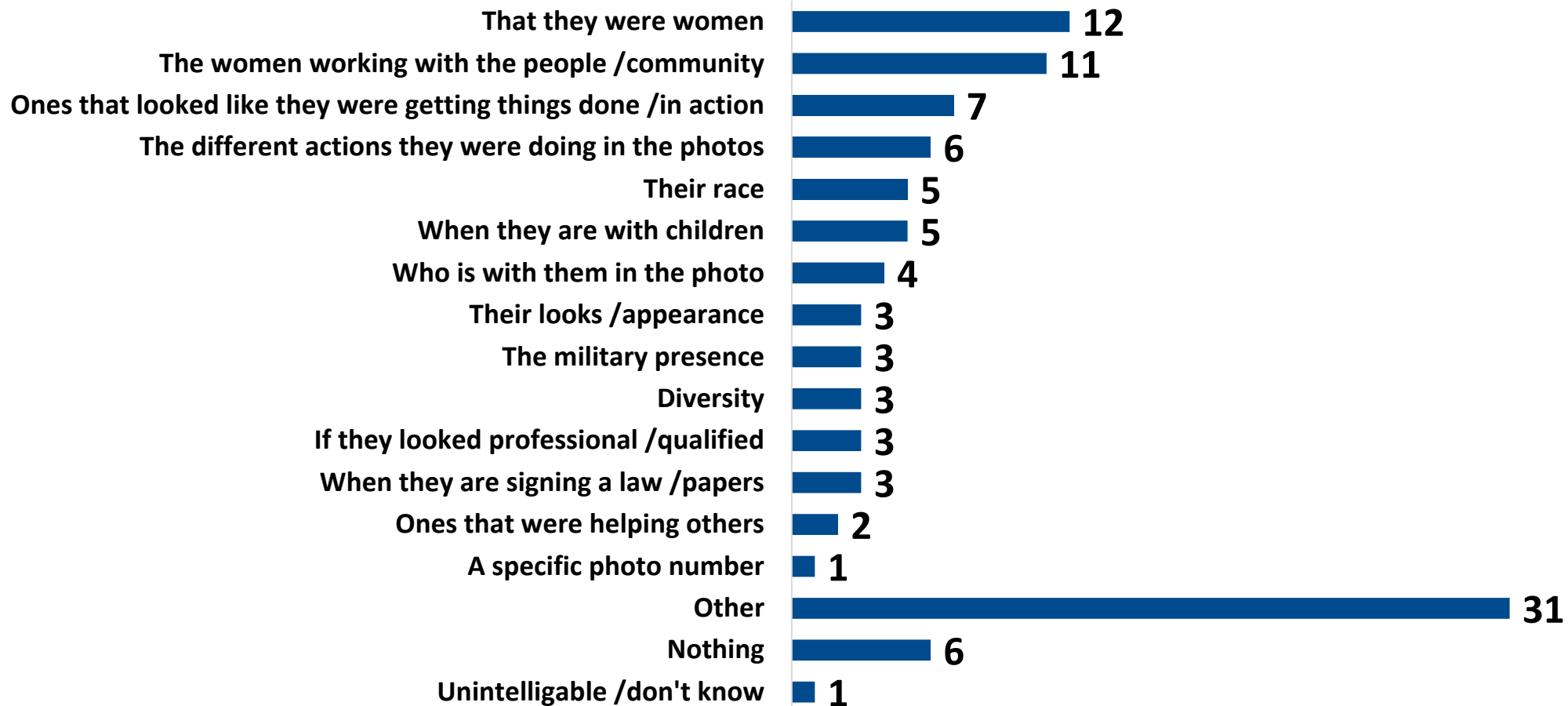

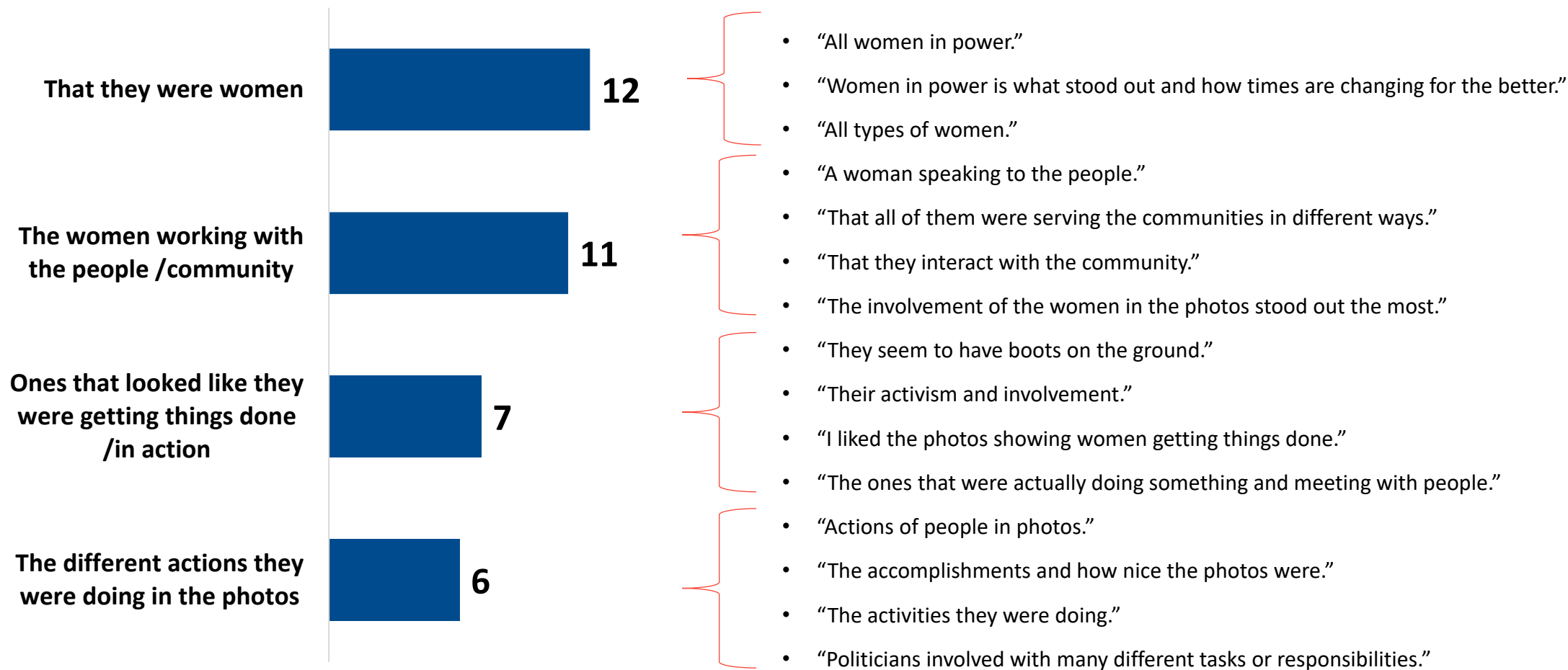

**Several women participants across groups thought Lieutenant Governor Eleni Kounalakis signing a bill signified that she is delivering an accomplishment, which is significant for voters and also for the lieutenant governor's experience and leadership. This photo conveys professionalism and high-value leadership.**



#### Positives

- “To me, she looks **stern, business-minded, very like on top of her game.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “**Professional and accomplishing something.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “She is showing her **ability to make decisions.**” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “She is signing something – **that is huge.**” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “I actually had chosen this because the woman is signing [it appears to be] **an important document.** So, you know, if you want them to **have experience**, that was the perception that I had.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

No negatives raised.



**The photo of Virginia Lieutenant Governor Winsome Earle Sears had mixed reactions in the focus groups. No one – those who reacted positively or negatively – seemed to know that she is in conversation with the governor. Participants liked that she is out in a community, listening and engaging. Some women participants worried that the dynamic favors the man.**



### Positives

- “Oh, she is sitting there, obviously, **out at a community event**, she is **rubbing elbows with somebody who could be important**, which means you know, as a female **she could handle her own**. You know, **she's well dressed**. So, you know those things just point out. And plus, **she's older too, so you know maybe she might have a little wisdom on it**. You know, it's hard to judge people just by looks, but you know, that's what it is.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “**That is what I would want in a politician is for them to listen and then respond.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor

### Negatives

- “I didn't like this because I feel like **the man is leading the woman**, like telling her stuff. So, that's the one I didn't like. – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “[She] kind of looked like **arm candy.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “And I did not like this because **the height difference bothered me**. It looks **like he's talking down on her.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

**The things that stood out to participants about the photo of Lieutenant Governor Deidre Henderson are that she is involved in education and is taking the time to authentically engage with children, which shows that she is hands-on. However, some thought this was just a photo-op or played into stereotypes about “women’s issues” like education.**



## Positives

- “Well, the fact that she's even with young kids in school. I mean, that's teaching them who she is, first of all. You know **a lot of times kids grow up and they don't really know anything about who's representing our states, and then just the hands-on.**” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “**She’s interacting. She is out there meeting with children, school- aged children, children that need to be educated because they're our future.** I like that.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “**I like the fact that also she's engaging with the children** and she's showing an interest in the education, and maybe she's, you know, going over some things or like they're telling her about what they're doing in the classroom, so she's interested in what they're doing. Also, **hands-on as well.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “**Being involved in education, and potentially hoping to help with some of the issues.**” – Man from a state with a woman LG
- “It’s just basically **making yourself seen**, you know. Some of the times, even with our lieutenant governor, I mean, except for when she was running, you know, three years ago, I didn’t really see her so much.” – Man from a state with a woman LG
- “**She actually looks like she's communicating with the children.** Doing really good there. And it’s she's engrossed in it. So, what she's doing, she, in fact, is enjoying her job with the children.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “The reason I chose that one more and that one piqued my eye the most is because **it doesn't look like a photoshoot. She is kneeling and she's actually engaging in the task**, so it's not just like show off or just to see like a photo op. That's what caught my attention. It seems like **she is genuinely trying to connect with the children. That is not just for show.** And that's what caught my attention more than the oh, it's a woman and children, looks nice. It didn't give me that impression.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

## Negatives

- “So, this is a lieutenant governor, and it sounds like you know she's volunteering at some spot but **trying to get a photo taken there. You know, do that on your free time.** You don’t need to announce it. Otherwise, **it’s too fake.**” – Man from a state with a man LG
- “Like one of my things is be humble you know as a leader. Like **do things just because you want to do them, you are not doing it because you want to get your picture taken.** You are doing it because **you truly care.**” – Man from a state with a man LG
- “I know a lot of people liked [this], but I really felt like **it just brought up like that stereotypical, like oh, put the woman with the kids and take a nice picture by them for me.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

**A photo of Lieutenant Governor Kristen Juras pouring over maps with a team including a man in a military uniform does not elicit much reaction across groups, but several woman participants say it stands out. This photo shows crisis management skills, which is important.**



#### Positives

- “That’s actually why I picked this. Because **it looks like they were more in like crisis management mode.**” - Woman from a state with a man LG
- “I chose this as one of mine because **the woman is dealing with the military.** I am kind of envisioning maybe like a state guard type situation. Again, you know, **we just had a major hurricane blow through our state, so that's important work,** at least that I see a lieutenant governor in my state would be necessary.” - Woman from a state with a woman LG

No negatives raised.

**A photo of Lieutenant Governor Juliana Stratton holding up a document with the governor also does not cause much reaction for participants. The few who react note that this photo conveys interracial cooperation and an achievement for constituents.**



#### Positives

- “I mean, not that I know any of those people, but for me, **it was just seeing a Black person and a white person willing to work together.**” – Man from a state with a man LG
- “It looks like **they got something resolved**, you know. It’s probably a signed piece of paper or **some legislation that, you know, would help constituents.**” – Man from a state with a man LG

No negatives raised.

**The photo of Lieutenant Governor Janice McGeachin at her office desk elicited more negative responses than positives. Several invoked an ivory tower. While this kind of photo used to convey hard work and dedication, now it seems to communicate distance from the people she is serving.**



### Positives

- “[She has] lots of papers. **It looks like she is doing a lot of work.** It seems like she is in an office, but again, we are assuming that’s her office.” – Man from a state with a man LG
- “I thought she was a Broncos fan.” – Man in state with a man LG

### Negatives

- “I didn't like this. I feel like **it's like locked away in an ivory tower** kind of.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “She **don't even look like she's supposed to be there.** Like **she is a secretary** and whoever is there, she just steps in and takes their picture.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “This looks like **a cluttered desk.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “Oh, so you are **sitting behind an office.** Great.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “This also kind of shows **like a staged set.** It's like **she's in that ivory tower of, you know, the law,** and **she comes down to hobnob with the locals.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG



**The photo of Lieutenant Governor Peggy Flanagan with a bullhorn is one of the most divisive in the focus groups. Participants who like this image say she's getting something done, this shows she cares, it is easy to understand her stance, and that she is out in community with the people and for the people. Others say she looks like an unprofessional troublemaker who cannot listen to opposing views.**



## Positives

- “She **looks like she'd be loud and probably get something done with that bullhorn**. So, you know that's why picked her. I was like **she looks like she could be loud and annoying and get some issues done**.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “She seems to be **out in the community helping with whatever the issue is**, showing that she kind of **cares about what the people have to say**.” – Man from a state with a woman LG
- “It looks like **she is saying something very powerful**, something very positive to get the crowd going. It just **looks very powerful to me**.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “**It's hard to track down what people in government have done, what bills they passed, what laws they passed, what they actually support, what they want for the future**. That can be hard to find out. It can be hard to find out whether they actually do believe it. **But with somebody standing in front of a black and white protest, it's pretty clear**.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “The picture shows that **she's out there with the people and she's not afraid to speak for us**.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “I feel like she was being **a part of the community**. She's **dressed like everyone else**. I mean, **she's like, one of us, basically**.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

## Negatives

- “I didn't like this because I see a protester with a bullhorn. **She just looks like a troublemaker**.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “To me, **she doesn't seem professional or serious**. And that's just going off of appearance, but that's the impression that I get.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “With the bullhorn and everything, it just brings up like oh, **this is somebody that's just going to scream at people who disagree with her**. This isn't somebody that can talk to other people. This is somebody that just **is going to yell and my way or the highway** kind of picture.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “[If she] was starting a riot, you know, then I might be a little bothered. I don't know what she is doing.” – Man from a state with a woman LG

**Participants have divided reactions to a photo of Lieutenant Governor Molly Gray in close conversation. Some like that she is listening to a senior citizen, while others read more nefarious undertones from the composition of the photo.**



### Positives

- “Because **she is talking to a senior**, which I think, **unfortunately, seniors in America are being ignored most of the time**. We're all going to get old one day and I would like some help if I needed.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

### Negatives

- “It just seemed they are like, I don’t know, **gossiping or eavesdropping**. I don’t know. That conversation doesn’t...I don’t know, it’s **something about that conversation that doesn’t seem right**.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “**It just seems like a private conversation**. Hi, baby. You know, **talking about something you don't want anyone else to hear**. All that comes to mind for me.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor

**Participants react positively to the photo of Lieutenant Governor Susan Bysiewicz's conversation with an older constituent. They note that this image shows genuine engagement and the ability to listen.**



## Positives

- “You know it seems **genuine**. You know, **she's sitting down with a constituent and they're having a very, you know, in-depth conversation**. But, yeah, I mean, to me, what resonates the most is it just seems very genuine and cares.” – Man from a state with a woman LG
- “I like it because it looks like **she is talking with the everyday folk, so relating to the people**.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “There are two people, and they look like **they are intently listening to each other and having a real conversation**. And either one of them could be the lieutenant governor, but it looks like **they are focused on what the other person is actually saying. They are listening**.” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “Outreach. Just like **talking to people like in everyday spaces**.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “It looks like **she's just in a cafe**, you know, **maybe in a small town talking to the rural older folks** or something.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “It struck me that she was, you know, **animatedly discussing something with that gentleman**. And to address an earlier question, one of the skills that I would value in a lieutenant governor is **the ability to negotiate. And it kind of looks like she's negotiating something**, and negotiation skills, I think, would be tantamount in that role.” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

No negatives raised.

## Lieutenant Governor Diane Primavera's ribbon cutting event gets mixed reactions from participants. Some think this is an achievement and illustrates involvement, while others think this is staged and not substantive work.



### Positives

- **“Promoting jobs, promoting employment, opening new opportunities.”** – Woman from a state with a man LG
- **“And showing that she's there and involved.”** – Woman from a state with a man LG

### Negatives

- **“Something for the media. It's just like something for the media.”** – Woman from a state with a man LG
- **“A photo op.”** – Woman from a state with a man LG
- **“Anybody can just show up for an event and cut a ribbon or accept a plaque or accept a check. I think a lieutenant governor, whether it's a man or woman, needs to actually work and get stuff done, not just the arm candy for the governor.”** – Woman from a state with a woman LG

**Lieutenant Governor Lisa Cano Burkhead's official headshot shows how important it is for a lieutenant governor to share images of engagement and action shots. While participants understand the utility of this kind of image, it gives them no information and should not be used for promoting a candidate.**



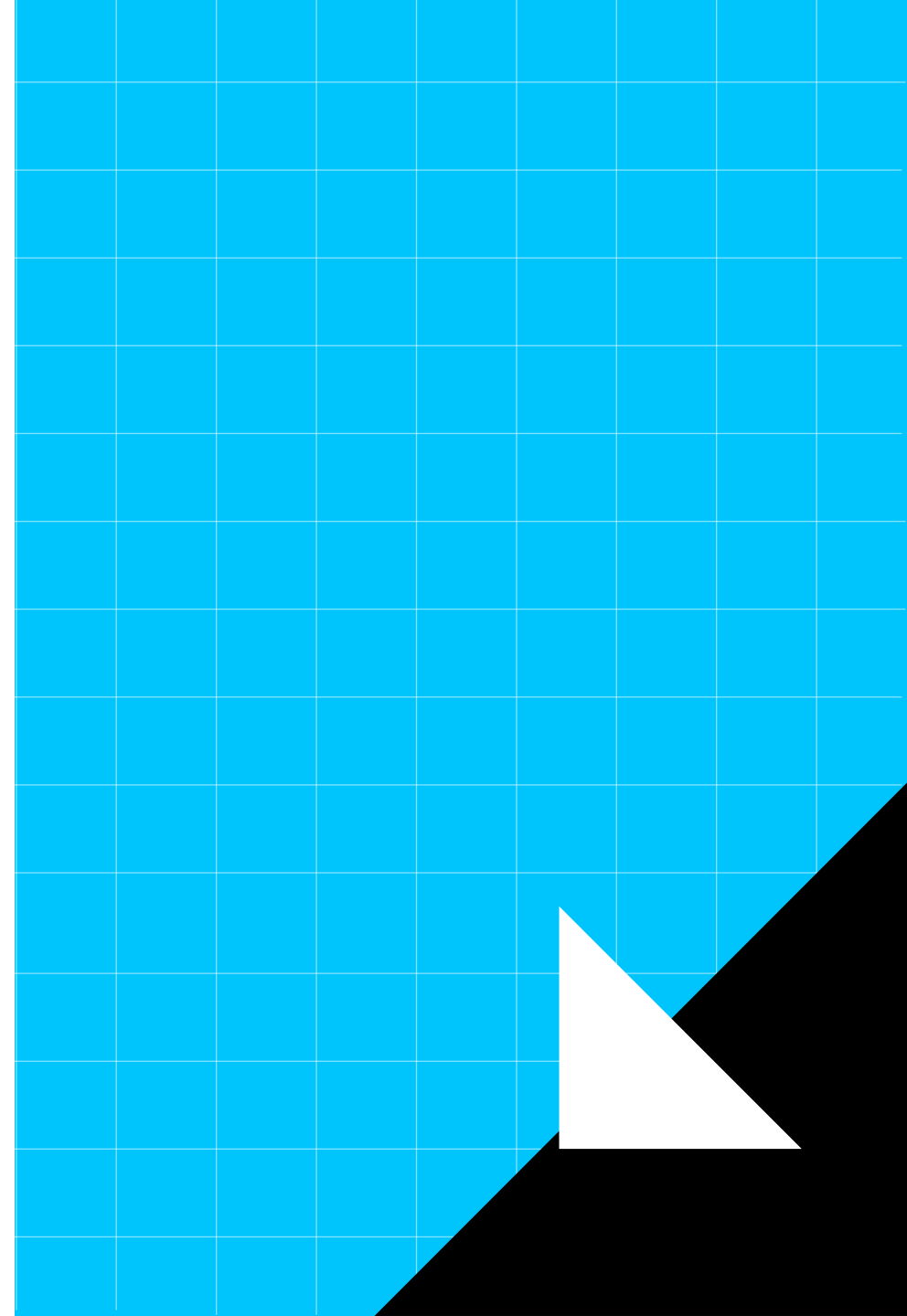
### Positives

- “[She] just **looks clean-cut.**” – Man from a state with a man LG

### Negatives

- “[This] looks a little **gimmicky.** Like, you know, even though she is smiling, it just **looks like what you expect.**” – Woman from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to governor
- “I don’t think you would possibly find your way out of it [taking this kind of photo as a lieutenant governor]. But I do agree it’s **not exactly appealing.**” – woman elevate state
- “[This] is good, but **I wouldn't really use that to promote myself. It's to have in the archives,** but I really wouldn't use it.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “**It's good for your office hanging on the wall,** but I don't care to see it, you know.” – Woman from a state with a man LG
- “The one that really bothered me was this one, because this is **this is a photo shoot.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “And **she's just looking pretty. It's for show.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG
- “I did not like this. **It just doesn't show her doing anything.** It's just like **a yearbook photo.**” – Woman from a state with a woman LG

Before voters elected her lieutenant governor, NAME served four terms in the state house, where she focused on our economic competitiveness as a state. NAME is credited for her leadership on addressing mental health, expanding affordable health care, attracting new and high paying jobs to the state and responding to the needs of small businesses.

As lieutenant governor, she has met with people across the state and led efforts to train more workers for high tech jobs, to prioritize community needs by safeguarding our neighborhoods and schools from violence, and to exceed the state's energy efficiency targets. Currently she leads the state's Post High School Readiness Program, which is focused on creating new and better career opportunities and job skills for people in the state.

She has a master's degree and volunteered in her community, where she expanded services for women and children survivors of domestic violence. A mom of two grown children, she first ran for office because she wants to make our state a great place to raise families.

# Profile 1 Takeaways

- Most subgroups rate each of the hypothetical women lieutenant governors similarly on intense qualifications and intense likeability. This is especially true for how men, women, Democrats, Independents, Republicans, and white voters rate each candidate on being very qualified and very likeable.
- The exceptions are:
  - Black voters rate the Latina woman as more intensely qualified than likeable.

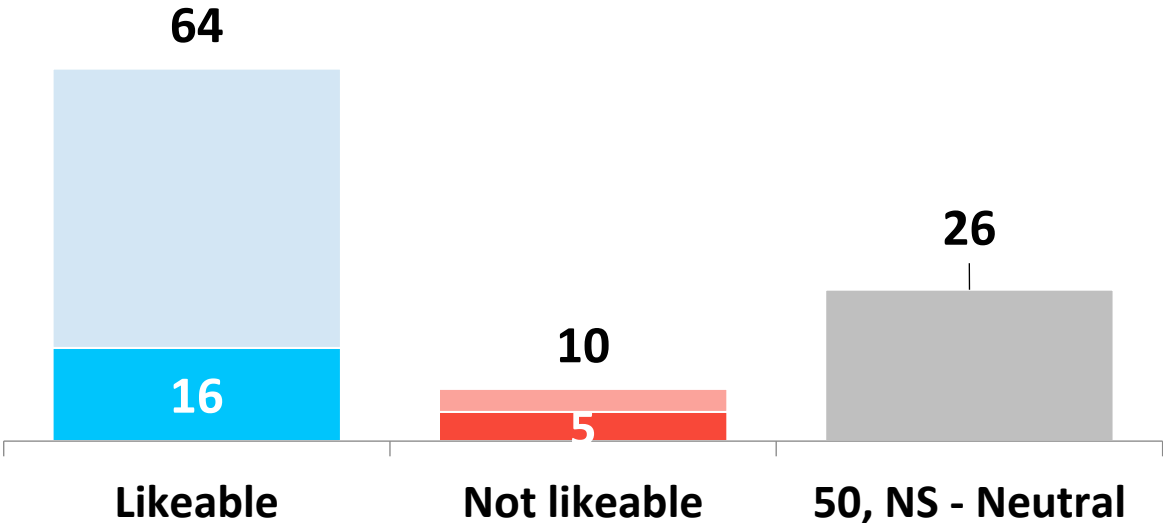

Three in ten Democrats and Black voters think the Black woman lieutenant governor is very qualified, and a quarter of women think the Black and Latina women are very qualified. # Profile 2 Takeaways

- Most subgroups rate each of the hypothetical women lieutenant governors similarly on intense qualifications and intense likeability. This is especially true for how women, Democrats, Independents, Republicans, white, Latinx, and AAPI voters rate each candidate on being very qualified and very likeable.
- The exceptions are:
  - Men voters rate the Native woman as more intensely qualified than likeable.
  - Black voters rate the Latina woman and Native woman as more intensely qualified than likeable.
  - Native voters rate the AAPI woman as more intensely qualified than likeable and rate the Black woman as more intensely likeable than qualified.
- Women rate the Black woman lieutenant governor higher than men on intense qualifications and rate the Latina lieutenant governor higher than men on intense qualifications and likeability.
- On both qualifications and likeability, Democrats rate the hypothetical AAPI, Black, Latina, and Native women lieutenant governors as more intensely qualified and more intensely likeable than the Republican voters do.

Most subgroups rate the two profiles of white women LGs about the same on qualifications. Democrats, Black, Latinx, and Indigenous voters think Cynthia Smith is more qualified to be the next governor than Sarah Anderson is, while Republicans think Sarah Anderson is more qualified than Cynthia Smith. There is notably a 20-point margin between how qualified Latinx voters think Cynthia Smith is compared to Sarah Anderson.

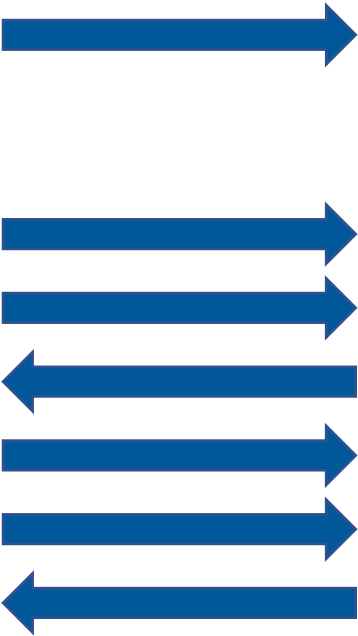

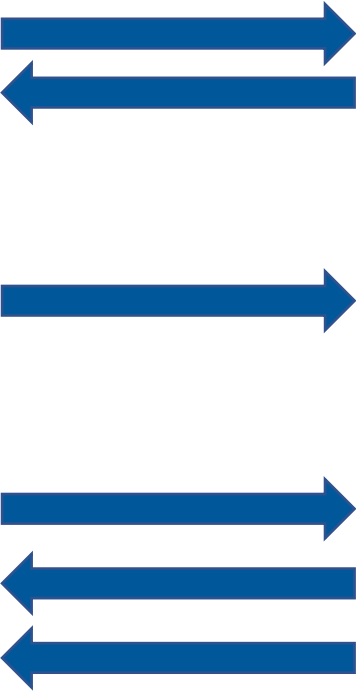

**In the focus groups, when asked what advice they would give to a woman lieutenant governor who is running for governor, many responses were oriented toward telling the candidate to highlight their accomplishments and to make sure they have a “resume” that reflects consistent accomplishments and actions, especially for the community. Many would also tell them to be true to themselves and to not just run on the fact that they are a woman candidate.**

“Have a well-rounded resume.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor

“Be true to yourself and what you think while you help others.” – Woman from a state with a man LG

“Stay consistent. When you start off good in the beginning when you're running for the office and you make all these little promises or goals, go one by one and do your goals, stay consistent. Don't veer off like oh, I changed my mind or no, we are not going to get that done or not finding reasons or obstacles and excuses to not get your goals done. Just stay focused and follow through.” – Woman from a state with a man LG

“Yeah, get your feet and your hands dirty. Go out into the community. Meet the people. You know make sure you are not perceived as sitting up there on the high horse or you know at the high house. You know you are one of the people and you are more relatable.” – Man from a state that has elevated a woman from SoS or LG to Governor

“Action. Not words, action.” – Woman from a state with a man LG

“I would like on your resume like, of course, list all your accomplishments of what you...you know what I am saying...like where you started and what you finished with and then you know have a diverse list of issues that you are willing to work on or you are starting to work on.” – Man in a state with a man LG

“I would say like highlight your achievements, like concrete.” – Man in a state with a man LG

“Highlight economic accomplishments or what they plan on doing with regards to the economy, like jobs and stuff like that.” – Man from a state with a woman LG
